

Who can donate blood? Anyone between 18 and 59 years of age. Under 21, the minor must have the written consent of the parent or guardian.

Do you accept Malaria or Jaundice? Malaria, yes, if there have been no attacks for two years. Jaundice at the present time, no. The advisory committee of doctors and scientists for the national Red Cross are again considering the jaundice problem. So, for the present, no jaundice.

If I have been rejected, should I try again?

Why not? Maybe your blood didn't have quite enough iron then, but might be all right now. Maybe you had a slight fever. Unless the nurse told you that you were a permanent rejection, try again.
