The completed field reports have been turned over to John F. Durr of Civic Service, professional survey consultant who supervises this Canyonwide survey and development project. Writing of the preliminary drafts of the industrial surveys of Mill City, Gates, and Lyons is now approximately 50 per cent complete. Preliminary drafts for each of these community surveys should be available for checking by each community committee by mid-June.



Titanic Detroit Dam on Oregon State Highway 222 between Detroit and Mill City rapidly is rising from the chasm hewn by years of erosion by the rushing waters of the North Santiam River. This recent photo gives for the first time a representative impression of the "face" of Detroit Dam. The exhaust-tube outlets used in regulating the water level in the reservoir impounded by Detroit Dam can be seen in the middle of the picture just above the cat-walk extending the length of the dam. The power house foundation can be seen in the fore-

ground. The height of the dam now is approximately 150 feet. When complete, the Detroit Dam will be 1,425 feet from its beginning on the Marion County side to its termination on the Linn County side. The North Santiam River, which separates Marion County from Linn County, at present is being diverted through a tunnel in the cliff shown in the background. Highway 222 is some 300 feet above the spot from which this photo was taken.
