

Bloodmobile Visits This City, June 25

Official spokesmen for civic and social groups caucused Monday noon at Mom & Pop's cafe on the important matter of the visit of the Red Cross Bloodmobile Monday, June 25, to Mill City and area.

Red Cross officials indicated that 200 pints of blood, collected each time the mobile unit sets up facilities, is the most efficient way for supplying the needs of the National Blood Program. "Experience has shown that 250 donors are needed for each 200 pints of blood collected for the blood bank," Mrs. Wm. L. Teutsch, Jr. said today.

Monday, June 25, is Blood Day for residents of Mill City, Gates, Detroit, Lyons, and surrounding areas. This is the first time in more than a year that the Red Cross Bloodmobile has come to this area. Some 50% to 70% of all blood taken in Marion county is destined for the Armed Forces. Within 24 hours after the blood is banded, it is headed for San Francisco where each night planes carrying whole blood head for Korea and the battle fronts.

Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, commanding general in the Far East, praised the American Red Cross for its part in supplying blood to the soldiers wounded in the Korea fighting in a letter released at Red Cross headquarters recently.

General Ridgway wrote, "The blood freely given by the American people and collected and turned over to the Armed Forces through the selfless service of the American Red Cross has been the vital factor in the saving of many of our wounded soldiers and in the prompt restoration to health of many more."

"The Red Cross was named by the government to co-ordinate all blood procurement efforts for the Armed Forces last August. Since that time it has met all quotas set by military authorities. Blood was procured by the 41 Red Cross regional (Continued on Page 8)

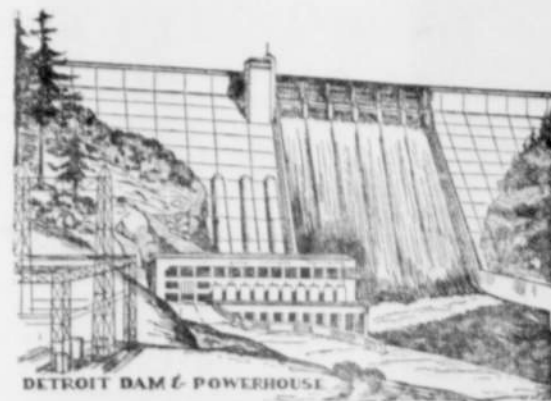

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Bonneville Awards Substation Work

Bonneville power administration awarded a contract Friday to Olson Electric company of Vancouver, Washington, for construction of the initial part of the Detroit substation. The contract was awarded on a low bid of \$79,755.

BPA's Project Engineer supervising this construction will be Mr. N. P. Nelson who will maintain headquarters at Mill City. The construction work under this contract will permit the use of 230 kv/13.8 kv transformers in providing construction power for continuation of the work on Detroit and Big Cliff projects.

This plan is necessary since the Detroit-Goshen section of the 230 kv transmission line is expected to be operating at its ultimate operating voltage by the end of 1951.

Gala Aquadics Seen in Detroit

Detroit, Mich., will be the capital city of American boating activities this summer. As a part of the city's 250th Birthday Festival, an elaborate program has been scheduled by the Aquatic Events committee, including sailing, rowing, and powerboat races of national and international interest.

All races will take place on the Detroit river, so that hundreds of thousands of spectators may watch them from famed Belle Isle park or from parks along the Detroit water front.

Commodore E. O. Bodkin, chairman of the committee, has announced the following calendar of events:

May 30—Annual outboard marathon from Detroit to Trenton, Mich., and return. More than 100 entries are expected in a race that will rival the famous Albany-New York race in excitement and number of entries.

July 7—Major inboard powerboat races, to include six classes ranging from 10-foot 48-cubic-inch puddle-jumpers to unlimited hydroplaners capable of speeds well over 100 miles per hour. Among the unlimited class contenders will be many that raced in former Gold Cup and Harnsworth events, and several new craft. The closed course, a three-mile circuit, lies between Belle Isle and the city. The race has the sanction of the American Power Boat Association.

July 8—Sailing race and review, for all types and classes from the tiny nippers and snipes to the large Mackinac racing-class sloops and schooners. These races are usually held on Lake St. Clair, far from shore, but this time they will be on the Detroit river between Belle Isle and the Ambassador bridge, within easy sight of spectators.

July 14-15—Rowing regatta, sponsored by the Detroit Boat club, oldest on the continent, founded 112 years ago. In addition to Detroit entries, there will be a large contingent from the Canadian Association of Amateur Oarsmen, and probably from St. Louis, Minneapolis, Chicago, Buffalo, and other rowing clubs of the Central States Association.

July 21-22—Two days of the thrills and spills that mark outboard races. On the first day, Saturday, the racers will be stock utility runabouts—a new class recently given official status by the American Power Boat Association. Sunday will bring out the racing hydroplanes powered with special "souped up" motors. Many of the leading drivers from Florida, Texas, and the East and West coasts will be entered.

July 24—On the actual birthday anniversary of Detroit, there will be a mammoth powerboat marine parade, possibly the largest assemblage and review of such craft ever held. (Continued on Page 7)

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Hiway 222 Access Given by New Road

Santiam Memorial hospital now is assured of an access road leading from highway 222 according to a decision reached this week by the Stayton city council, hospital building committee, and property owners abutting the new right-of-way to the hospital site, Mayor M. J. Martin indicated today.

The proposed hospital street is an extension of the short stretch of north-south highway 222 alongside Goode's Floral Gardens in Stayton. Plans call for the new street linking highway 222 and the Fern Ridge road. The Santiam Memorial hospital building site is 1,000 feet north of highway 222.

The new right-of-way for the Santiam Memorial hospital was donated by property owners Oliver Juel, Geo. H. Bell, T. G. Freres, and A. B. Dombrowsky. Stayton is going ahead with plans for laying a water main to the hospital site.

X-Ray Visit Needs Mill City Support

The Willamette Valley Chest X-ray program's success or short-coming in Mill City in the very near future hinges primarily upon the keen cooperation and generous gifts given it by civic and social groups here, Mrs. George Ditter, local X-ray chairman announced today.

Equipment and personnel from the U. S. Public Health Service are being made available to the Willamette Valley on or about July 11. The Federal Health agency, division of chronic disease and tuberculosis, will provide X-ray machines, necessary materials and personnel.

In order that Mill City can fully take advantage of this great service it must provide local leadership, support, space, certain equipment and services, office supplies, telephone services, postage, medical policies and supervision, and a sum equal to 16 cents per person X-rayed.

The Federal Health agency is very interested in X-raying every adult in this community. From a public health standpoint, the discovery of tuberculosis is of primary importance. By finding unknown cases of tuberculosis it is possible for many persons to begin treatment when their disease is in an early stage of development. Under these conditions it can be more easily and quickly cured and its spread to others prevented.

The movable X-ray machine will be placed in a convenient center in Mill City. It is as easy to have an X-ray made as to have a snapshot taken. First, the individual goes to an X-ray unit, gives his name and address to a (Continued on Page 8)
