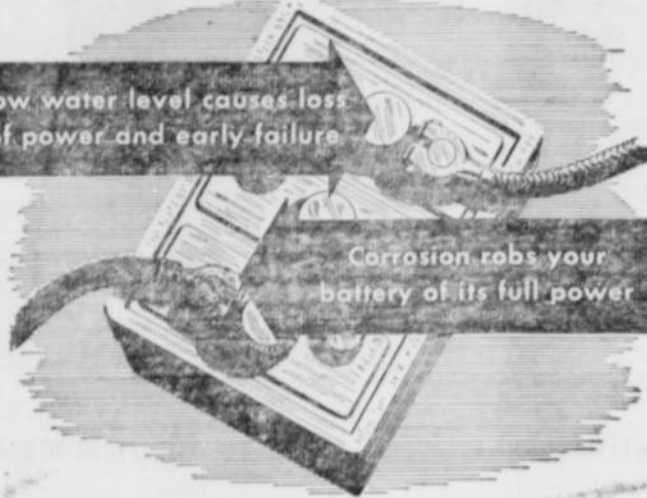

Halsey Stamps Out Their Rat Problem

Albany—The rodent control program in the City of Halsey has proved very satisfactory according to reports from the Linn County Health Department. The Halsey rat control program was started April 23 at which time 82 per cent of the buildings within the city were infested with rats. Eradication measures were taken by the city. The city was systematically covered house by house and block by block, and poison bait was placed in all buildings infested with rats.

A follow-up inspection was made June 6 by Fred Weber, Linn County Sanitarian, and Milton H. Buehler, Jr., Rodent Control Consultant, Oregon State Board of Health. At the time of this inspection all buildings in the city were free of rats with the exception of one chicken house. It was also noted that many of the citizens of Halsey had taken active steps in cleaning up garbage and refuse on their premises. This general clean up helps eliminate food sources and harborage areas for rats. The city officials and the citizens of Halsey are very proud of their rodent program and intend keeping their city free of rats in the future.

Halsey is the first city in Linn County starting an active rodent control program following the published report of the rat problem which exists in Linn County as determined by a county-wide rat survey made during the months of December and January. It is felt that other cities in the county could gain much by observing the activities of Halsey in the control of one of man's most damaging pests.
