Detroit Reservoir Area Restricted

A special closure in the vicinity of the Detroit Reservoir area, designated Area No. 50-P (Detroit Reservoir-Blowout Area) went into effect June 7, according to word just received by Supervisor J. R. Bruckart of the Willamette National Forest. This closure is necessary due to the extreme fire hazard that exists incidental to clearing operations in this area, and it provides that an entry permit must be obtained by persons wishing to enter this area for business purposes only.

The entry permit will provide (1) to refrain from smoking except in places designated as safe in said permit; (2) to build no open fires except in places designated as safe in said permit; (3) to have as part of his equipment when using campfires, except when traveling as a pedestrian and or camping at improved, designated and posted campgrounds, tools as specified by the Forest Service suitable for extinguishing fires.

The closures will go into effect under proclamation of the Governor of the State of Oregon under Section 107-210, Oregon Compiled Laws Annotated, as amended by Chapter 252, Oregon Laws, 1945, and by order of the Regional Forester, J. Herbert Stone, U. S. Forest Service, under Regulation T-1 (1) applying to the national forest lands within the boundary of the Willamette National Forest.

Complete description of the area and entry permits may be obtained at the Detroit Ranger Station. Permits will not be issued for any form of recreational use such as picnicking, hunting, berry picking, etc.

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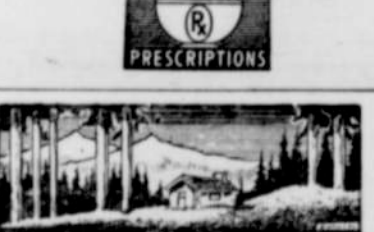
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
