## Outerson Estate Problem Aired

Detroit—Mr. Don Stanley from Portland, who is attorney for the real estate division of the Corp of Engineers for the Detroit area, presided at a special meeting at the Hut in Mongold Monday evening. The meeting was called specifically for all those who own property, i.e. buildings and such on the Outerson estate here. This property has caused considerable uncertainty as to the outcome of its settlement for sometime. Those involved have been rather uneasy since much difficulty has been experienced in settling with those who own buildings on the property. Mr. Stanley's being here cleared up many points. It was his purpose to give the information here that would assist in the cash settlement of this property as soon as possible. He began his address by giving a brief explanation of the difficulties the Corp of Engineers and the government have encountered in trying to settle this estate. He explained how the first John Outerson had come to Detroit and with his brother Thomas, had owned a store and a

dwelling here. These were willed to his brother at the time of John's death in 1917. These two pieces of real estate, the house and store, and personal effects were willed to his brother, Thomas. However, he did own some other property, timberland and such that were not mentioned in the will to his brother. This according to law, reverted back to include his sisters also, one of whom was residing in New York City, one in Edinburgh Scotland, and two in Porta, Scotland, and one is deceased. This last is 1931 information, at which time these sisters ranged between the ages of 60-70 years. It is not known whether or not there are descendants of these sisters. This is the point which slows things down for the attorney. The only known heir is now residing in Michigan. He is John Outerson Jr., son of Thomas. He has been very cooperative but has not produced information concerning those who are in Scotland. He made an effort to quiet title in 1942. Another suit cannot be filed until 1952 when it is

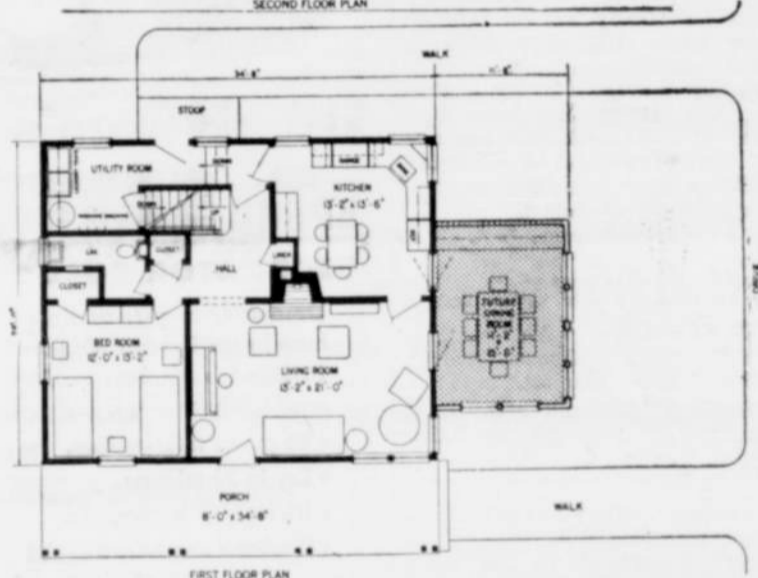
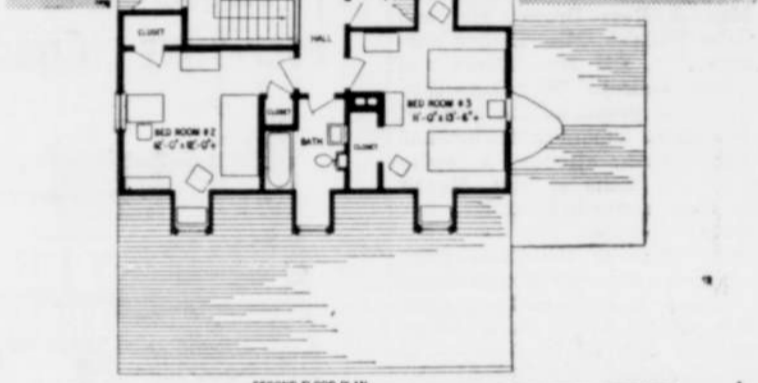
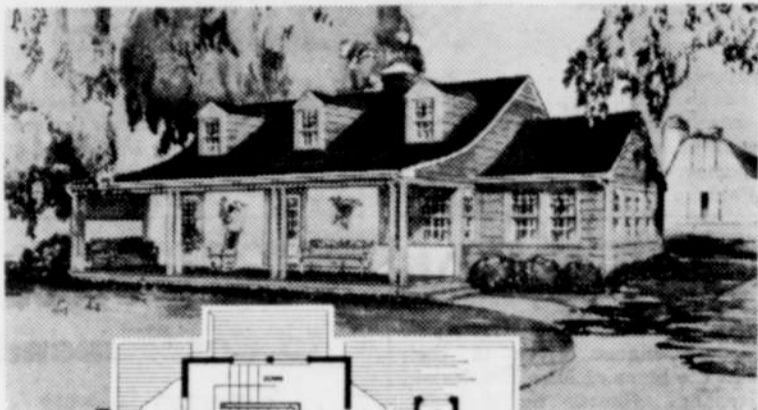
expected that all buildings will have to be removed from the reservoir site which includes the property in question.

Mr. Stanley could not give amounts which have been set aside for the various dwellings individually. He did, however, give the amount by tracts and suggested that the persons involved could get together and make some agreeable decision as to how the money should be apportioned. Wrangling and ironing out in the court, would thereby be avoided and thus payment could be forthcoming a bit sooner. Some of these tracts concerned Outerson only. Those which are timbered lands, while some other tracts involve dwellings, courts, business sections and church property and these comprise a large part of the business section of Detroit.

Mr. Stanley stated that their next step will be the filing of a condemnation notice or declaration of taking, and depositing the amounts decided upon by the appraisers for this property with the chief engineer's office in Washington D. C. and then wait for their decisions.

Nearly everyone who has property or holdings of any kind in this section were present at the meeting. Mr. J. Devers and Mr. George Bell, attorneys for the Outerson estate, were present.

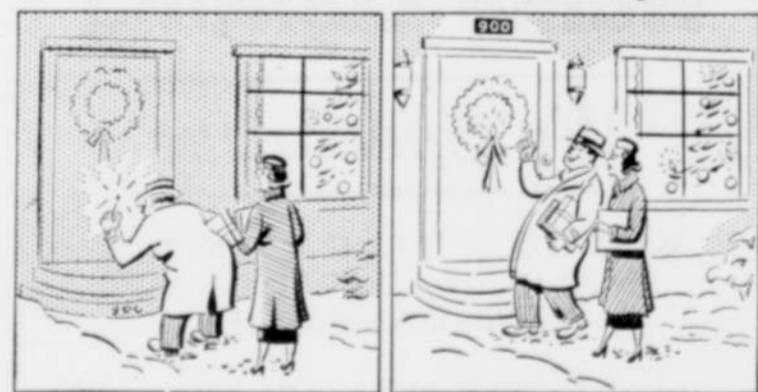
## Houseplan Available From OSC
