## Father Carl Mai's 25th Anniversary

Father Carl Mai of St. Catherine's church in Mill City and the St. Boniface church of Sublimity, during a special celebration in the Parish hall in Sublimity May 29, received the plaudits and recognition attending his completion of 25 years service on April 11, 1951, as a Priest.

Archbishop Edward D. Howard of Portland by his presence on the Altar of the St. Boniface church and 40 visiting Priests honored the 25th anniversary of Father Mai. He was further feted by the visiting Priests at a congratulatory dinner in the Sublimity Parish hall.

Sunday, June 3, Father Mai held solemn High Mass for parishioners, an that same evening headed a reception line in the Parish hall during a program again in his honor. Father Mai, during this special occasion, received the greetings and best wishes of over 600 Canyon friends. A delightful lunch was served as a part of the Father Mai reception in the Parish hall, Sunday evening. Father Mai was presented with a purse by fellow Priests in recognition of his 25 years of devotion, and also another one during the reception.

Father Mai was born in Germany. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ed Mai, at present, live in Germany. From Germany, Father Mai went to China and nine years of missionary work. In 1931 he was captured and later released by bandits in the Fukien Province of southern China. Father Mai's Chinese language teacher, another priest, was killed by bandits.

After spending a few years in China, in 1935, Father Mai sailed for the United States and Michigan. He came to Oregon for the first time in 1938, and did parish work in Shaw until 1940 when he returned a second time to the East to Newark, N. J. In 1945 he returned to his Oregon work in the Jordan-Sublimity communities. Then in 1946 he began his mission work in the Mill City area where he is at present sewing.


Mr. Ed Mai and family of Chicago, Illinois, attended the celebration in honor of Father Mai. Ed Mai is the brother of Father Mai. Also Father Mai's sister, Mrs. Hugo Heller and family of Chicago, Illinois, were present. His mother's visa did not arrive and prevented her coming to her son's 25th anniversary. She may arrive later.

During the visit of his brother and sister, Father Mai and they toured some of the scenic spots of Oregon such as the Santiam Pass, the great Red Woods, MacKenzie Pass and the Coast.
