Mr. and Mrs. Earl Allen spent the weekend at Belnap Hot Springs. They plan visiting also Mr. and Mrs. Shackleford of California.

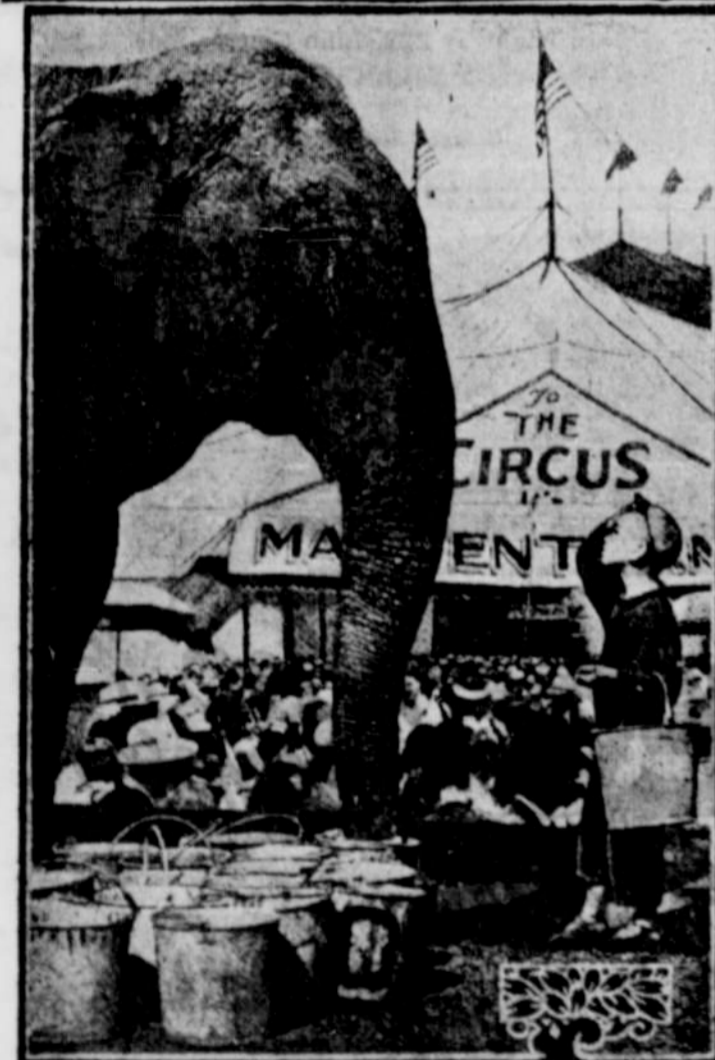
