Miss Daisy Hendricson, Mrs. Gladys Lake and son, Jack, drove to Cutler City last weekend for a visit with the Cecil Lakes.

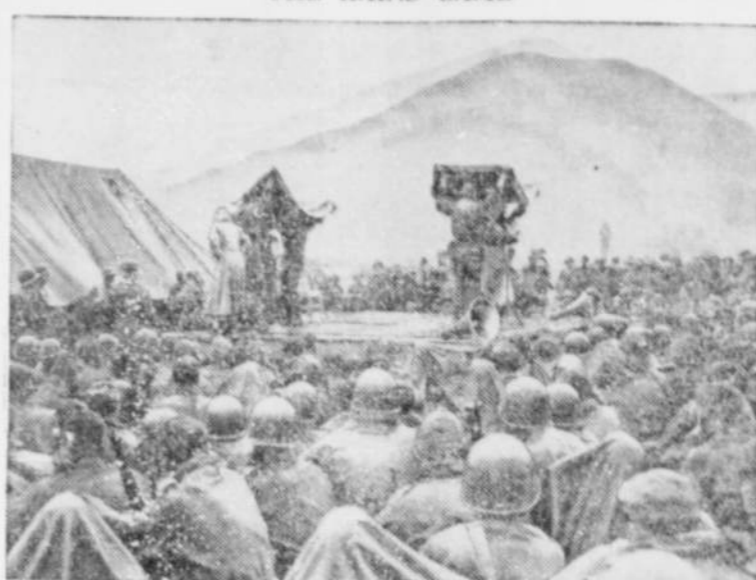
