50,000 Guidance Tests Given By OSC Bureau

More than 50,000 guidance tests were given by the Oregon State college counseling and testing bureau this past year, according to David O'Dea, supervisor.

The tests may be taken on a voluntary basis by students who indicate a desire for assistance in determining their particular abilities and talents. They are available to any student for a nominal fee.

More than a dozen different tests in such divisions as achievement, interest-inventory, personality, aptitude and diagnostics are available. The number given each student depends on individual circumstances, O'Dea said.

No one test score may be relied upon completely since so many variables are involved, O'Dea pointed out, but a general pattern that is fairly reliable may emerge from a number of tests.

O'Dea emphasized that while the counseling bureau and school counselors assist students in every way possible, final decisions on the basis of the tests are always left to the individual student.
