These are only a few of the many projects which the Camp Fire Girls will carry out all week as a part of their Camp Fire program. They realize the many fire dangers in the homes. They can cite to their parents an imposing array of statistics that much can be done in home fire prevention. Each year 5,600 persons are killed by burns, explosions, and fires in the home; 2,000 persons suffocate, 1,000 are asphyxiated, and there are 1,000 fires a day in homes.

While they are busy making their homes safer, Camp Fire Girls will not neglect their annual Membership March. Prospective and new members will be urged to join in the organization's fire prevention activities.

Camp Fire is open to all girls seven to eighteen years of age of all races and religions.
