Henry Thessin, the owner of a farm property five miles southeast of Salem, is just completing 2,500 feet of diversion terrace on a sloping field This terrace winds around the hill on grade and should intercept surface that has been flowing into and damaging a cherry orchard. Thessin plans seeding the diversion terrace to improved pasture such as is now in the adjoining land.

Over 100,000 feet of tile has been installed the past few months in the Santiam soil conservation district. Tile has been installed on the farms of Henry Miller and Fred Hottinger of Stayton, Tony Minden of Sublimity; Ralph Wilson, Sappingfield and Kleen, Nichols, and the Marchant farm all living east of Salem and north of McClay. Assistance in laying out was secured from SCS Engineers working with the Santiam SCD. Financial assistance was secured from the Mario nCounty PMA located at

A mobile crew of soil scientists, of the U .S. Soil Conservation Service, has been soil mapping the area of land east of Stayton including the Mehama and Elkhorn area.
