 Next week there will be another column, if someone doesn't see fit to shoot me previously. Happy Archimedes' birthday!

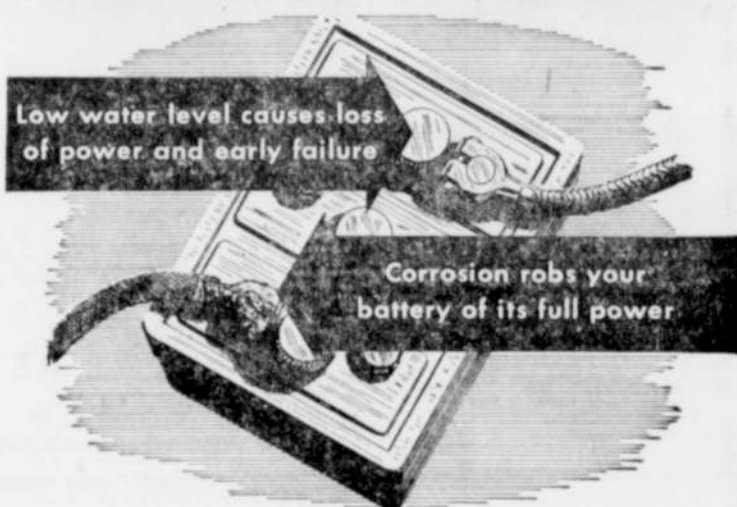
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
