Mrs. Charles Tucker, member of the membership committee reported an enrollment of 32 for this year. Mrs. Kenneth Martig responded to a plea from Mrs. Walter Thomas, leader of the local Girl Scouts and Brownies for assistance by volunteering to help with the Brownies.
