Frozen Logger. . . . At Forks the record has been played so much on the juke boxes that a hooktender with a hangover yanked off a calked boot and heaved it through one machine when it began to chant at breakfast time—

"As I set down one evening In a timber town caffay, A six-foot, seven, waitress To me these words did say—

"I see you are a logger, And not a common bum, For no one but a logger Stirs his coffee with his thumb!"

I know how the boot-heaving hooktender felt. For 23 years I've been hearing this ballad and backing off from reckless invitations to render it myself. It was rigged up in the most offhand way, at a Thanksgiving Day dinner, for a radio program on which Stewart Holbrook, H. L. Davis and I were working together. One requirement was for an original song about a logger. I had a notion over the pumpkin pie and coffee and began to exude verses of a kind.

In them the large waitress went on with her sad story—

"Yes, I am six-foot, seven, And a logger who courted me— He broke his leg one summer Three feet below the knee."

Pinetop Blues. . . .

Soon thereafter the radio magnate who had us literary lights under hire went broke. In pursuit of Paul Bunyan lore and other ancient items of Lake States lumber history, my wife and I took a trip back to Bay City, Michigan, and the Au Sable country for a year.

Nobody remembered "Jack Haggerty" and the other shanty-camp ballads that were so popular among the pinetops and river pigs of old. And the only Paul Bunyan stories I heard were from men of the jackpine plains who had read them first in my books. At one gathering or another I'd render "The Frozen Logger," and after six months or so, when I'd look up some old heads to inquire of them about ballads and tales of the old pine camps, I'd often be treated to a verse or two of—my own composition! Such as—

"So now I mourn my logger, There's none like him today. If you'd pour whiskey on it, He'd eat a bale of hay."

"He never shaved the whiskers From off of his horny hide, But he'd pound 'em in with a hammer, Then bite 'em off inside."

"Silver Jack used to render that," an old pinetop would solemnly declare. "I heard him often. He would render it like a blues song. Pityable to hear." It's a Great Country. . . .

Well, anyhow, much more has happened to, and from, "The Frozen Logger." One lad used it and another ballad no better to make a start in life which led, last I heard, to an income of a thousand a week. And now "The Frozen Logger" is out in sheet music and the Weavers have put it on a record that's for sale all over the land.

So it sings from the logging town juke boxes—

"The weather tried to freeze him, It tried its mortal best. At a hundred degrees below zero, He buttoned up his vest."

But he did freeze, at a thousand below, and so solidly his corpse was made into ax blades to chop the Douglas fir.

There you are. The only moral I can think of is that in this great land anything can happen to anybody any time, what with me winding up in my old age on the sheet music racks and the juke boxes.
