## National Camp Fire Girl Director Due

Miss Martha Allen, national director of Camp Fire Girls, is scheduled for a visit to the Willamette area council, January 10, 1952. This visit is one of many on her northwestern tour. This will be Miss Allen's first visit to the Willamette area council.

Miss Allen will be the guest speaker at the annual dinner of the council, which will be held this year in Dallas. She will appear also at other functions in her honor, following her arrival in Salem the morning of January 10.

Miss Allen has been national director since March, 1943. Previous to that she was assistant executive of Camp Fire Girls, filling that post in 1941. She was graduated with a B.A. degree from Mississippi state college for women in 1928 and received her M.A. from Columbia University in 1930. Miss Allen taught in public schools for several years and then worked with the board of public welfare in the District of Columbia.

She served with the resettlement administration and was later appointed by the farm security administration to organize the community program at Greenhills, Ohio. She was employed by the Cincinnati metropolitan housing authority as supervisor of tenant selection and consultant to the projects manager on tenant management relations and the community activities programs.

Miss Allen's many contracts in civic, educational, and social welfare fields and her administrative ability have made her an outstanding success as national director of Camp Fire Girls.

The Detroit Woman's Civic club met in the home economics room of the high school on Wednesday evening of last week with Mrs. Lillie Helwig presiding. Following a short business meeting, Mrs. Helwig called upon the program chairman Mrs. Pat Crawford to introduce the speaker of the evening, Mr. C. C. Davis, who is with the army engineers at Lookout dam. Mr. Davis spoke on the topic of Okinawa having been for many years a resident of Okinawa with the army engineers.

He gave many interesting sidelights, explaining the size, location, the climate and the people, including their customs and beliefs. He stated that Okinawa has the highest literacy of any country as everyone must attend school until he is twelve years of age. They have some high schools there and one university. He also stated that the ordinary Okinawa owns no property excepting his family burial plot, however, there are some who do own property. He explained their custom of burial which he stated was most likely a remnant of the Chinese. His description of the various typhoons, that is one or two very severe ones which he witnessed, the names and velocity of these was most interesting.

**GORILLAS ARE THE CUTEST PEOPLE** These three baby gorillas reside in the San Diego zoo, where they are playing an important role in scientific research. Brought to this country from West Africa when they were only seven months old, they are being studied to determine a normal growth pattern for gorillas. It is believed that such a pattern can be applied to children. Left to right, they are: Bata, Bouba and Albert. When brought to the zoo, all three were suffering from vitamin deficiency and weighed less than 8 lbs. each. Working with Lederle Laboratories, their keepers put them on an orange-flavored vitamin preparation, the same type given to children. Today, at two and a half years of age, the gorillas are healthy and lively and weigh about 50 pounds each. Gorillas, like man, are very susceptible to respiratory infections. When Bata, Bouba and Albert display symptoms of a cold, they are given aureomycin. Little is known about the growth of gorillas, since none has ever been born in captivity and there are so few of them available for close, scientific observation.
