

It won't be easy to keep this sleigh filled with Coconut Fruit Drops—they are that good. **COCONUT FRUIT DROPS**

- 1/2 cup currants
- 1/2 cup raisins
- 1 1/4 cups sifted flour
- 1 1/4 teaspoons double-acting baking powder
- 1/8 teaspoon salt

Cover currants and raisins with cold water. Bring to a boil and simmer 5 minutes. Drain and keep covered. Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt and sift again. Cream shortening and butter, add sugar gradually and cream together until light and fluffy. Add egg and beat thoroughly; then add vanilla. Add

- 1/4 cup shortening and 1/4 cup butter
- 1 cup cane or beet sugar
- 1 egg, unbeaten
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 cup shredded coconut

half of flour and mix well. Then add hot fruit mixture and remaining flour, stirring thoroughly after each addition. Add coconut. Chill about 1 hour. Drop from teaspoon on ungreased baking sheet. Bake in hot oven (425° F.) 10 to 12 minutes, or until done. Makes 4 dozen cookies.

of the Gates school district. He was very gracious and gave me much of his valuable time in answering questions and discussing school affairs. I had heard rumors that the Gates school district was in debt. I could find nothing in their budgets or the auditor's report to be concerned about. It is true that Gates has outstanding warrants to the extent of approximately \$30,000, but they appear to be properly authorized by levy.

I think the consolidation of Gates to the Mill City school district would be a most valuable addition, bringing experienced men into the school affairs of this canyon. Representation of Gates on a consolidated school board should certainly protect the grade schools of all the present districts. If an injustice is being done it is the duty of any member of the board to report to the people so that they can bring pressure to bear on the board and thereby maintain local autonomy. It is our duty to elect true representatives and not a group of "yes" men to handle our school affairs, no matter what district is involved.

As to the Holy report, it is a result of considerable study by experienced men in school affairs. It was made to an interim committee appointed by the legislature, and cannot be considered just the opinion "of one man". Among important recommendations made by Dr. Holy is this one, "Citizens of Oregon should be concerned with the problem of state control in the field of education." "Generous support alone will not assure good schools," the report states further.

Now for the economically minded

taxpayers who would like to see their money spent to the best advantage, I give you this analysis, taken from state-wide figures that anyone may have from the state superintendent's office.

The state average cost per student to operate a high school plant for a student body of 50 or less has been found to be over \$600 per student to as high as \$2200 for one school year; the average cost for a student body of 50 to 100 was \$400 per year; for 100-200 students was \$350; for 200-300 was \$325 per year; and so on to a 1000 student body the cost was approximately \$260 per student.

At the same time as the cost went down the number of subjects available increased, giving the student more opportunity for choice.


A study of floor space required for a student body of 50 and 250 gave this interesting set of figures, worthy of your notice:

In general class rooms, the space required was 17% for 50 students and 38% for a student body of 250; administration, corridors, toilets, and heating, etc. space was 17% for a student body of 50, while a student body of 250 required only 21% of the floor space; cafeteria space required was 15% for 50 down to 12% for 250; and gym space dropped most rapidly from 50% for a small student body of

50 down to 28% for a larger student body of 250 students.

There should be no doubt as to which is the most efficient size school plant, the taxpayers of any district should not have much trouble to decide what they want. Any taxpayer who has doubts can call upon the local school superintendent in their city or call at the state superintendent's office in Salem and satisfy themselves on any question.
