"Oh, what fun it is to ride in a one-horse open sleigh!" There isn't much room left for riders in this sleigh, but then, who wouldn't willingly give place to a load of such delectable cookies as these. It won't be easy to keep this sleigh filled with Coconut Fruit Drops—they are that good. Served with either a hot or cold beverage, you'll find them a happy choice for the light and simple refreshments so important to your holiday "open house" entertaining.

COCONUT FRUIT DROPS

1/2 cup currants
1/2 cup raisins
1 1/4 cups sifted flour
1 1/4 teaspoons double-acting baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt

Cover currants and raisins with cold water. Bring to a boil and simmer 5 minutes. Drain and keep covered. Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt and sift again. Cream shortening and butter, add sugar gradually and cream together until light and fluffy. Add egg and beat thoroughly; then add vanilla. Add

1/4 cup shortening and
1/4 cup butter
1 cup cane or beet sugar
1 egg, unbeat
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup shredded coconut

half of flour and mix well. Then add hot fruit mixture and remaining flour, stirring thoroughly after each addition. Add coconut. Chill about 1 hour. Drop from teaspoon on ungreased baking sheet. Bake in hot oven (425° F.) 10 to 12 minutes, or until done. Makes 4 dozen cookies.

of the Gates school district. He was very gracious and gave me much of his valuable time in answering questions and discussing school affairs. I had heard rumors that the Gates school district was in debt. I could find nothing in their budgets or the auditor's report to be concerned about. It is true that Gates has outstanding warrants to the extent of approximately \$30,000, but they appear to be properly authorized by levy.

I think the consolidation of Gates to the Mill City school district would be a most valuable addition, bringing experienced men into the school affairs of this canyon. Representation of Gates on a consolidated school board should certainly protect the grade schools of all the present districts. If an injustice is being done it is the duty of any member of the board to report to the people so that they can bring pressure to bear on the board and thereby maintain local autonomy. It is our duty to elect true representatives and not a group of "yes" men to handle our school affairs, no matter what district is involved.

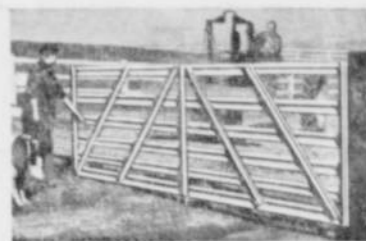
As to the Holy report, it is a result of considerable study by experienced men in school affairs. It was made to an interim committee appointed by the legislature, and cannot be considered just the opinion "of one man". Among important recommendations made by Dr. Holy is this one, "Citizens of Oregon should be concerned with the problem of state control in the field of education."
"Generous support alone will not assure good schools," the report states further.

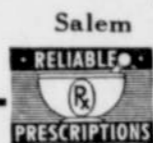
