National Camp Fire Girls Director Visits

Miss Martha F. Allen, national director of Camp Fire Girls, Inc., will arrive in Salem on Thursday, January 10, for her first visit to the Willamette Area Council, according to Miss Enid Wolcott, executive of Camp Fire Girls. During her short stay in the Willamette Area several functions are scheduled by the Camp Fire Girls Council members in Benton, Marion and Polk County districts. Marion County leaders, board members and other friends of Camp Fire will have an opportunity to meet Miss Allen and talk with her at an informal coffee hour to be held at the First Methodist church in Salem Thursday forenoon.

Mrs. S. M. Zeller of Corvallis, chairman of Camp Fire Girls Region VI comprising Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington, members of the Area Board and Miss Wolcott will entertain Miss Allen at luncheon on Thursday.

Thursday afternoon the Benton County Camp Fire council and other friends will meet and talk with Miss Allen at an informal tea in the Union Building at Oregon State College in Corvallis.

Highlight of Miss Martha Allen's visit will be the annual dinner meeting of the Willamette Area council to be held in the Chamber of Commerce hall in Dallas the evening of January 10, at which time Miss Allen will be the guest speaker. Miss Allen has been associated with Camp Fire Girls, Inc., since 1941 when she became assistant national director. Her wide experience in administration, education and community relations has aided her in making the organization one of the nationally-recognized youth agencies in the country. Miss Allen has been national director since her appointment in April 1943.

A native of Cherokee, Alabama, Miss Allen graduated from Mississippi State College for Women, Columbus, Mississippi, and received a master of arts degree from Columbia University, New York. Prior to association with Camp Fire Girls, Miss Allen was connected with the Metropolitan Housing Authority in Cincinnati, Ohio. She also has served with the United States Department of Agriculture's Resettlement Administration and Farm Security Administration in the Green belt, Maryland, housing projects, and at one time she was associated with the Board of Public Welfare in Washington, D.C. Miss Allen taught at McComb, Mississippi, high school and at All Saints college, Vicksburg, Mississippi where she also acted as faculty advisor to the student council.

Miss Allen is a member of: American Association of Social Workers; Executive Committee of the National Social Welfare Assembly; Board of Directors, National Publicity Council; Committee on Better Organization of Support for Social Welfare (Community Chests and Councils of America and National Social Welfare Assembly); National Budget Committee and the National Quota Committee (sponsored by Community Chests and Councils of America and National Social Welfare Assembly).

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OPS Conducts Its Homemakers' Quiz

Q. A friend of mine wants to sell me his 1947 car, but says he is not under price ceilings. Is this true?—M. B. Portland

A. Your friend is wrong. He must sell his car to you at, or below, the specific ceiling price for the make, model, line or series. To avoid dispute, we suggest that you get the actual price on the car from your District OPS office, Lincoln Building, Portland 4.

Q. I heard something on the radio about an OPS "enforcement survey" of service trades. What is it?—K. M. Salem

A. All retail service establishments, like service stations, repair shops, laundries and dry cleaners are required to post their ceiling prices where customers can see them. The OPS enforcement survey is a nationwide check to see that this is being done; and that the posted ceiling prices are the correct ones for the individual business.

Q. How do savings stop inflation?—C. E. P. Vancouver, Washington

A. The money you save keeps that much money from competing for limited amounts of goods on the market. As you know, inflation may be simply defined as "too much money chasing too few goods." Your personal savings not only guarantee your security but are a direct aid in the fight against inflation.
