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Free Methodists Set Servicemen's Sunday

The Free Methodist church at Mill City is joining with the other churches in the denomination throughout North America in the observance of Servicemen's Sunday, February 3. This day has been set aside by the denomination to honor its men and women who are serving in the armed forces.

Chief objective of the day according to Ernest Keasling, national director of the Servicemen's Department, is to stimulate the local people to pray more for those who are serving their country in this capacity, and to impress upon them the importance of sending encouraging letters to any they may know personally.

"The Church that Cares," as the Free Methodist church is often called due to its personalized service, has nearly 4,000 names on its active roster at the present time. To these young people are sent denominational and religious literature, seasonal greetings on holidays, birthday greetings, regular letters of encouragement and personal correspondence to all who write the director for any purpose.

In addition to this the department has 202 service pastors located near military bases to serve the personal interests of the men reported to them. The four regional directors, as well as Keasling, personally visit hundreds of men who are located in training camps and hospitals. Even the Korean casualties and those stationed in Japan are contacted by the church representatives. A favorite among these is Jake DeShazer, former Doolittle bombardier, now missionary in Japan.

According to the pastor, Rev. C. O. Tremain, servicemen's families and the general public are invited to worship with the members of the Free Methodist church to honor those who are now sacrificing to defend their country.

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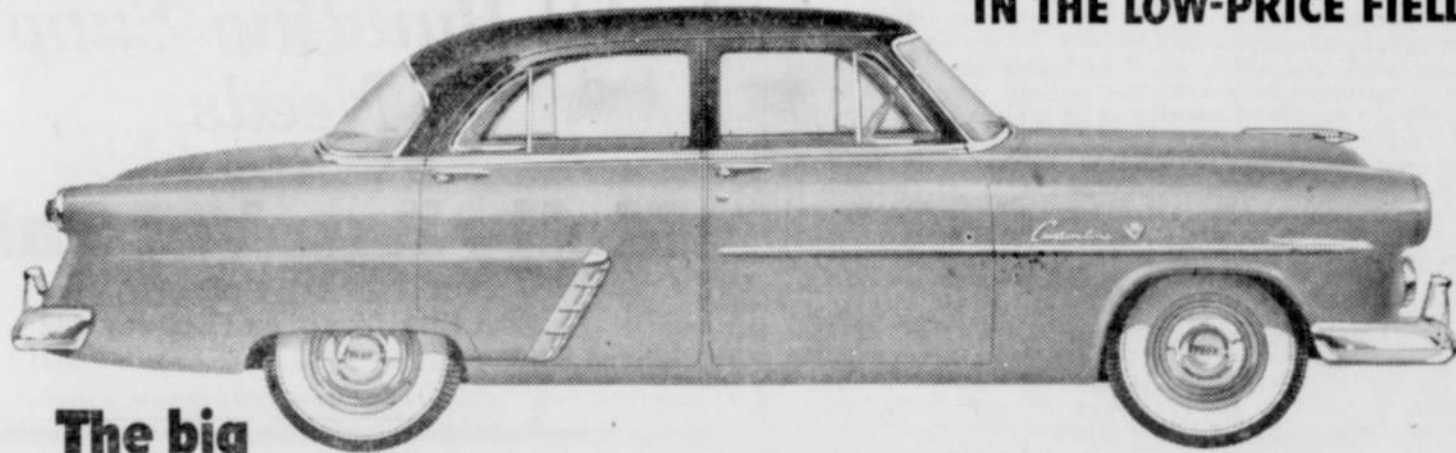
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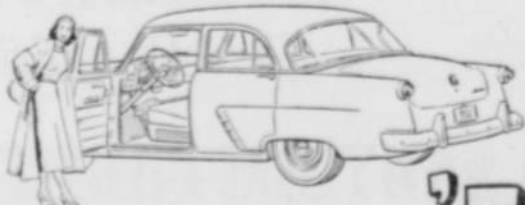
