Two-tone colors will be available as extra-cost options on four body styles and standard on the Country Sedan and Victoria. The Victoria also is available in six single body colors.

Colors of interior garnish moldings, instrument panels, door trim panels and seat sidepanels vary to harmonize with upholstery fabrics and exterior colors. Ford offers two-tone leather-type vinyl interiors as standard on three station wagons and as extra-cost options on three Mainline and three Customline body styles.

To point up the fashionable quality of Ford upholstery materials, large department stores throughout the country feature women's "Motor Mate" coats colored to match 1952 Ford Victoria exterior body finishes and lined to match upholstery designs.

In addition, men's sports jackets made of genuine Ford Craftweave broadcloth upholstery materials will be worn by many salesmen in Ford dealerships.

Three two-body color combinations will be available on the Mainline RanchWagon, three combinations on each of the Customline Tudor, Fordor and club coupe, three on the Customline Country Sedan, and six two-tone combinations will be available on the Victoria in the Crestline.

Solid body colors for 1952 are Raven black, Sheridan blue, Alpine blue, Woodsmoke gray, Shannon green metallic, Meadowbrook green, Glen Mist green, Carnival red metallic, Hawaiian bronze, Sandpiper tan, Sungate ivory and Coral Flame red. Sungate ivory and Coral Flame red are special colors in 1952. Coral Flame red is an exclusive Sunliner color. As a solid color, Sungate ivory is reserved for the Sunliner, and as a combination, it is available on the Ranch Wagon and Victoria.

Area Requests Some Thirty Million Dollars

Key 230,000 volt transmission grid additions and power facilities for major load centers, requested in President Truman's 1952 fiscal year budget message, were announced today by W. E. Trommershausen, Southwest area manager, Bonneville Power Administration, Eugene. Area funds requested for the area for the new year starting July 1, 1952 total \$31,000,000 out of a budget of \$74,296,400 for the entire Pacific Northwest.

Construction funds for the Southwest area will center on major high voltage grid additions, relief of present critically loaded transmission lines, and increasing capacity to power deficit load centers of the area, Trommershausen pointed out. Work already under way or scheduled for 1952-53 will integrate scheduled generation from Hungry Horse, McNary, Chief Joseph, Albeni Falls and Willamette river dams now under construction, with the U. S. Columbia river system.

"Area facilities, mostly 115,000 volt transmission lines and substation facilities, will increase service reliability and provide added power capacity to the Bonneville customers in the area," said Trommershausen. "Ability to meet the rapidly growing power requirements of the area through adequate transmission facilities, will help insure a steady and sound growth for the area economy."

Homemaker's O.P.S. Tips and Comments

Q. With spring housecleaning in the offing, I want to know if rug and furniture cleaning and repairing are under price control. M.S., Lebanon

A. Yes, these are covered by the OPS regulation on services. Your ceiling price should be no higher than the highest price charged during the base period December 19, 1950 through January 25, 1951. Of course, it can be less.

Q. Are there ceiling prices on hosiery repair? D. B., Coquille

A. Yes, there are. Also, wherever hosiery repair work is done, there should be a sign giving OPS prices or the pricing method. Be sure to check what you pay against the ceiling prices posted.

Q. Does inflation hurt the farmer? R. T., Salem

A. Yes, indeed. Like any other consumer, a farmer must pay more for what he buys, such as clothing, machinery, building materials and many other things. Farmers also depend on the buying power of the American people for their living. Inflation cuts that buying power, the farmer's income goes down.

Q. Are restaurants under OPS? I'm a traveling man and it seems to me I pay many different prices for about the same kind of meal. A.E., Portland.

A. Yes, restaurants are under price control but they do not have fixed dollar-and-cent ceilings on food items. However, owners may not increase their average percentage markup on food items over what they charged in 1949. This, of course, accounts for

A. No, the Interstate Commerce Commission sets the rates for rail and truck transportation charges but OPS does study proposed rate increases and protests against any which seem to be unjustified or inflationary.

Q. Why aren't there ceiling prices on prescriptions? O.L.M. Tillamook

A. Professional service charges are not controlled by OPS. A pharmacist is selling his professional services in compounding prescriptions.
