Homemakers' Price Quiz

Q. Are rug and furniture cleaning and repairing under price control? A.Y., Portland.

A. Yes. The ceiling price should be higher than the highest price charged during the base period Dec. 19, 1950, through January 25, 1951. These prices should be posted. And if you're ever in doubt on the ceiling price for any such service, save your sales slip and contact the Portland District Office in the Lincoln Building. Service firms have filed their ceiling prices with us. We can check them for you.

Q. How many kinds of price rises are there? Sounds like there must be a lot of them, since OPS keeps allowing so many. M.M., Longview.

A. There are two kinds of price rises. Those allowed by OPS to relieve actual hardship cases and those required by the Capehart and Hurlong amendments to the Defense Production Act. As for the number of price increases allowed by OPS, that number is actually very small compared to the millions of articles now under price control.

Q. Heard that OPS would bring suit to collect any money I was overcharged and give it back to me. Is that right? A. M., Salem.

A. Not exactly. OPS will bring suit for overcharges but if a fine is imposed, that goes only to the U. S. Treasury. You can, as a consumer, bring action yourself. In that case, OPS would testify for you as to the proper ceiling price. OPS also tries to get an out-of-court settlement for the customer.
