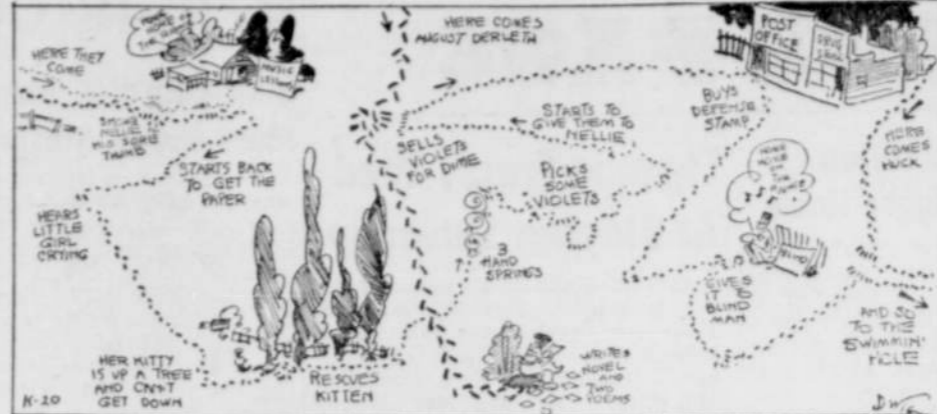
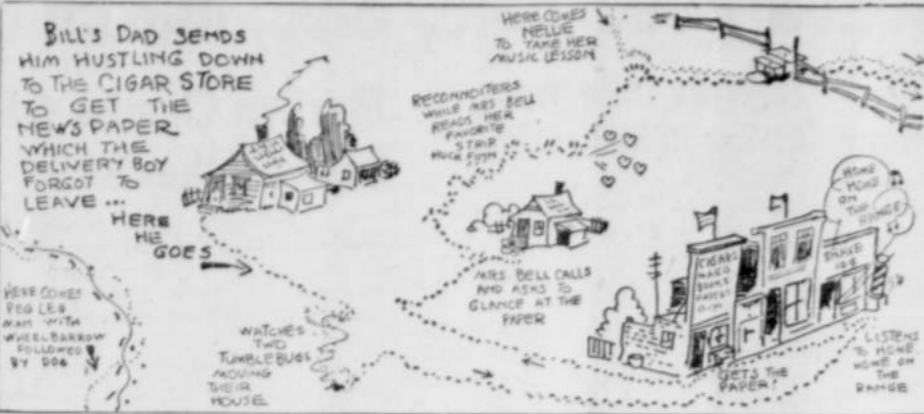

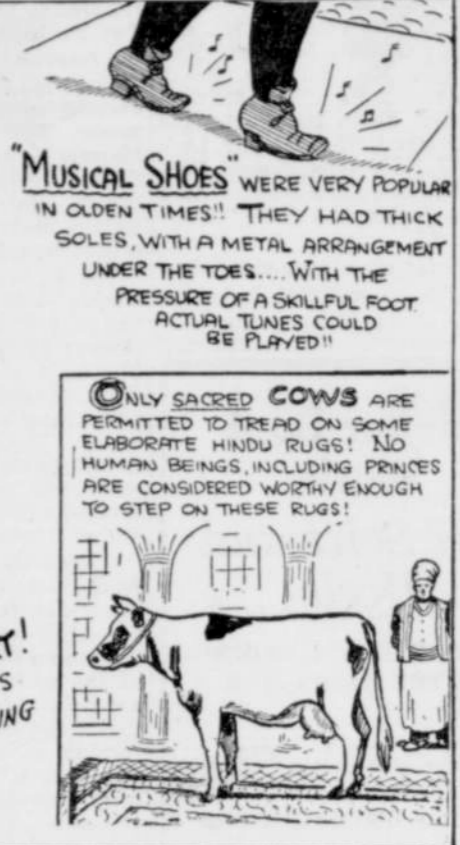


GATES

He has never fully recovered from injuries suffered at that time.

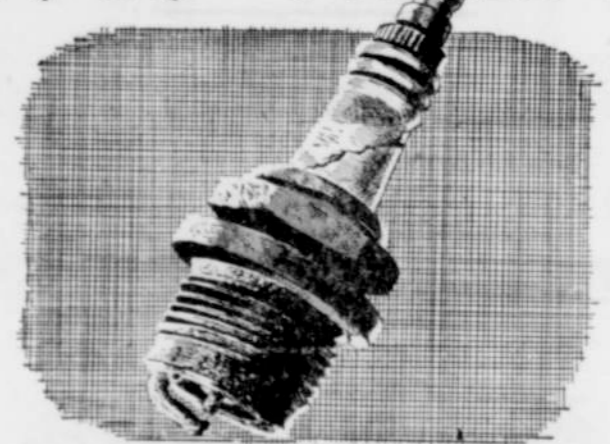
LYONS
