## Sublimity Saint Wins District Tournament; Mill City Takes Fourth Place Honors

St. Boniface wins district B-2 basketball tournament. Valseltz steals second place and Falls City walks off with third. The Mill City Timberwolves nip the fourth place slot.

The district tournament was conducted in a single elimination style. The winner, St. Boniface will represent district B-2 in the state B tournament to be played in Salem March 13, 14 and 15.

The first round of play was Thursday March 6, with Gates, Marion county third place team meeting Valseltz, Polk county first place team. Gates put up a tough battle the first half but in the second half they went to pieces to be defeated 55 to 43. Following the Gates vs. Valseltz game the Polk county second team Falls City defeated the Multnomah-Clackamas representative Corbett, 48 to 40.

The first round of night play was the Marion county second place team, Mill City meeting Yamhill county first place team, Amity. Mill City victorious 61 to 41. Mill City led the ball game from the jump at the beginning of the game although Bob Edgren of Amity who stands 6 feet 3 inches, dropped in 23 points. The next game of the evening was Marion county first team, St. Boniface, and Marion county fourth place team Jefferson. Jefferson gave the Saints a scare by leading the second quarter of play by four points, until Ruef of Sublimity pushed in 4 points in 19 seconds before the half time buzzer. The Saints led the second half by two or three points

which gave a victory for the Saints of 50 to 47.

The second round of play was Friday night with Valseltz edging Falls City 40 to 39 in one of the more exciting games of the tournament.

The next game of the evening was the Mill City vs. St. Boniface. The St. Boniface Saints tallied another win against Mill City by defeating them 63 to 46. The Mill City Wolves were in the ball game until the fourth quarter when Dick Kanoff and Roy Chase fouled out of the ball game. The Saints had a lead of three points at the end of the third quarter count. Ron Ruef and Roy Christianson's constant sharp-shooting led them to victory in the fourth quarter.

Saturday night Falls City met Mill City for third place in the tournament. Falls City edged the Mill City Timberwolves by two points, 44 to 42. Mill City led this ball game until the last two minutes of play. Duane Dunaway tied the score with a lay-in. The score was tied with 30 seconds to play and Steven Poe dropped in two. The final game for championship of the district was between Valseltz and St. Boniface. The Saints victory 66 to 56. Valseltz led the ball game for the first four minutes of play. The Saints took the lead after Ron Ruef and Jack Gries poured in two. Valseltz didn't gain a lead on the Saints after this point, although the score was tied part of the time. The Saints walked away from the Valseltz Cougars during the second half.

a well regulated city, I do however question the fairness of such a measure at this time. As you know, those of us who occupy trailers are temporary residents, and, with the completion of construction of the dams we will be leaving this area. Therefore, for your consideration may I pose the following questions:

"Should we who now occupy trailer houses on private premises and who have gone to considerable expense in constructing cesspools, laying water pipes and fuel lines, be forced to move at our expense by July 1st, when an ordinance could be enacted prohibiting only the parking of ADDITIONAL trailer houses and requiring NEW trailers arriving in Mill City to occupy regular trailer camp sites?"

Given as the reason for enactment of the presently proposed ordinance is, quote: "We have had a number of complaints and find that very seldom are the city sanitation requirements complied with and in no case do we find where the building code is observed."

Furthering the above statement, allow me to bring to your attention the following facts and may I have your explanation of what corrective measures are proposed for these city code violations by July 1st:

1. Do the (2) outside toilets in the city park comply with both the building code and sanitation requirements?

2. Does the open sewer ditch at a certain local trailer park satisfy the sanitation code?

3. Does a local motel owner who has constructed said motel since enactment of the building and sanitation codes, have a waiver of record permitting a publicly occupied building to be located over a septic tank?

I dare say that a proper inspection could uncover many failures to observe both the building and sanitation codes. Now then, considering the apparent lack of corrective measures taken to rectify mistakes of property owners in the past, I feel your ordinance as proposed would be discriminatory against those of us who in good faith moved trailer houses on private property in the ABSENCE of a prohibitive ordinance. Further, I again respectfully request that you allow your temporary trailer residents to occupy their present locations until such time as they move from Mill City.
