New Cake—Easy to Make

Then add 3 tbsp. soft high-grade shortening (all or part butter adds flavor)
1 egg
½ cup milk
1 tsp. vanilla
Stir together until ingredients are blended. Then beat vigorously for 1 minute.
Stir in gradually ½ cup milk. Beat for ½ minute
