FIGHTING SHIPS

U.S.S. OSPREY - AMS 28
THE 136 FOOT, WOODEN-HULLED MINESWEEPER OSPREY, BUILT IN 1921, SWEEPED JAPANESE MINES SHORTLY AFTER COMMISSIONING.

AT THE OUTBREAK OF KOREAN HOSTILITIES, THE OSPREY WAS ORDERED TO A PRE-ASSAULT SWEEPING OPERATION AT POHANG.

THE OSPREY, WHICH WAS SEEN AS MUCH SERVICE AS ANY OTHER SHIP IN KOREAN WATERS, MADE AN ASSAULT SWEEP ALONG SIDE WOLMI DO ISLAND AND TOOK BART IN THE INVASION OF INCHON.

THE ENEMY STRUCK HER ON OCTOBER 29, 1950 WHEN ONE MAN WAS WOUNDED AND A HOLE WAS TORN IN THE DECK BY FIRE FROM ENEMY SHORE BATTERIES OFF WONSAN, KOREA.

AFTER 19 MONTHS OF CONTINUOUS DUTY IN KOREA, THE OSPREY IS STILL SWEEPING MINES AND THE MEN OF THE SQUADRON MEET THEIR SLOGAN "WHERE THE FLEET GOES — WE'RE THERE!"
