Views on Co-operatives Given in New Bulletin

A good attitude on the part of its members is one of the most valuable assets a farm co-operative can possess, according to Dr. G. E. Korzan, assistant OSC agricultural economist.

Dr. Korzan is author of an OSC experiment station bulletin "Member Attitude Toward Co-operatives," now available for distribution. Copies may be obtained by asking for station bulletin 509 at county extension offices or OSC.

The bulletin outlines some of the responsibilities and privileges of co-operative members, based on a survey of 1952 members of 16 Oregon farmer co-operatives.
