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
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Mill City School Board Case **Up For Trial In Albany**

The special proceedings filed in the Linn county circuit court, Judge Victor Olliver presiding, by Charles Powelson will be heard 10 o'clock, Friday, April 4, in Albany. This case arose in Mill City school district 129-J through the actions of the school board regarding school property. The main controversy centers around a deed to school property executed by the school board to the Mill City First Presbyterian church. Powelson contends that the deed was not executed within the requirements of the law.

The April 4 date finally was agreed upon as the time for hearing the matter.

To Mill City residents, the property in question can be identified as the Corbin property which abutts the property upon which the Mill City offices and garage stands. After the property was allegedly transferred to the Presbyterian church, it was again deeded to the Corbins and the old Presbyterian manse moved upon it. Since the manse has been placed upon the triangular shaped plot of land, much improvements has been done upon the former manse.

The question of the regularity of the school board's action in deeding to attend Mr. Caughey, he ordered away this plot of school property without the vote of the people caused not a little enthusiasm in school affairs a year or so ago. 
