Mrs. Ramie Martell and infant son have returned home from Lebanon. They spent some time at the home of her sister after leaving the hospital.

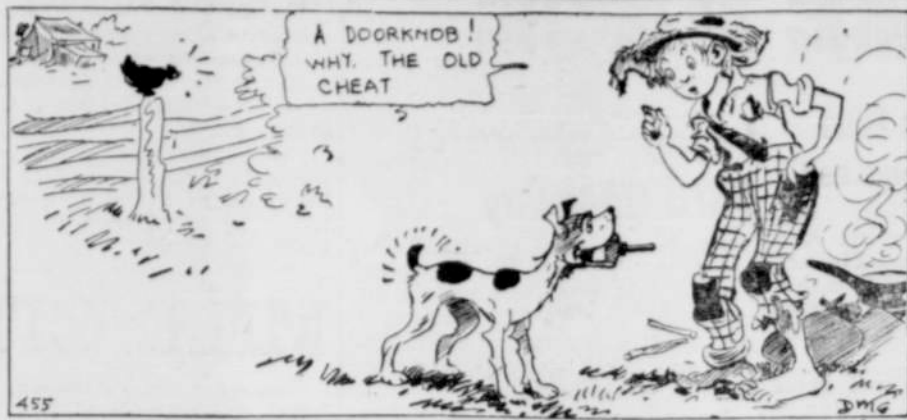

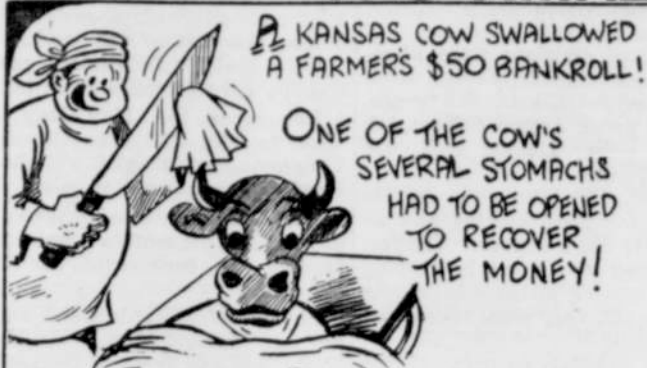
