# Star Recipes

BOB HOPE is the country's leading expert on pies. He's had more pies thrown at him than any other comedian, and he's tasted them all-while wiping them off his chin. Bob, who is soon to be seen in Paramount's "My Favorite Spy" has a favorite pie-vanilla custard. It's a delicious pastry and economical too. "Make one," suggests Bob, "And try it on your husband." Serve it, of course. Don't throw it! Here's the recipe:

VANILLA CUSTARD PIE

Plain pastry 3 eggs, slightly beaten % cup granulated sugar

1/2 leaspoon salt 3 cups bottled milk 2 teaspoons Burnett's Pure Vanilla

Roll the pie crust to 1/4-inch thickness and 2 inches larger than the diameter of the plate. Line a 9-inch pie plate with this pie crust, fitting it loosely. Fold back the edge of the pie crust all the way around and bring this double fold to an upright position. Flute the double fold of pie crust in the following manner: Place the floured tip or knuckle of the index finger of the right hand against the fold on the inside of the pie crust rim, so that it is between the tips of the thumb and index finger of the left hand, which are on the outside of the pie crust rim. Pinch gently, then remove the fingers and continue this same fluting motion around the entire rim of the pie.

Combine the eggs, sugar and salt. Add the milk and vanilla, and pour into the pastry shell. Bake at 450° F. in a preheated oven for 30 to 40 minutes or until a silver knife inserted in the center comes out clean.
