Oregon State College—More than 1300 requests for technical information or assistance were filled during a past two-year period by personnel at the Oregon Forest Products laboratory.

Visitors to the laboratory on the Oregon State college campus, including 49 scientists from foreign countries, numbered 1238 for the same period, according to Richard Plow, administrative assistant.

Small and large operators connected with wood industries have found the laboratory to be an invaluable information source on complete utilization of forest products.

Wood preservation, wood chemistry, hardwood production, wood seasoning and fiberboard manufacture are but a few of the many subjects on which information is available. Facts and figures can be furnished from either the laboratory's investigations or its extensive reference file.

With the Veterans' Administration field office in Salem closed, ex-servicemen today were reminded of assistance available to them at the office of Marion County Veterans' Service Officer, Ridgley C. Miller, in the State Library building.

"This office works closely with the Veterans' Administration regional office in Portland, and with other federal and state agencies handling veterans' benefits," Miller said, "and we are only too happy to render any assistance to which veterans or their next of kin may be entitled."

Miller was a field representative in the Salem Veterans' Administration office for 5 1/2 years until he resigned a year ago this month to take over the county veterans' position. Since then he has conducted more than 4,000 interviews in the county job, both in the Salem office and on itinerant visits over Marion county.

He said he is available to explain veterans' benefits before veterans' organizations or other interested groups anywhere in the county or adjoining areas. He shares space in the State Library building with the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs.

The Salem Veterans' Administration office was closed on April 30, after seven years of operation.

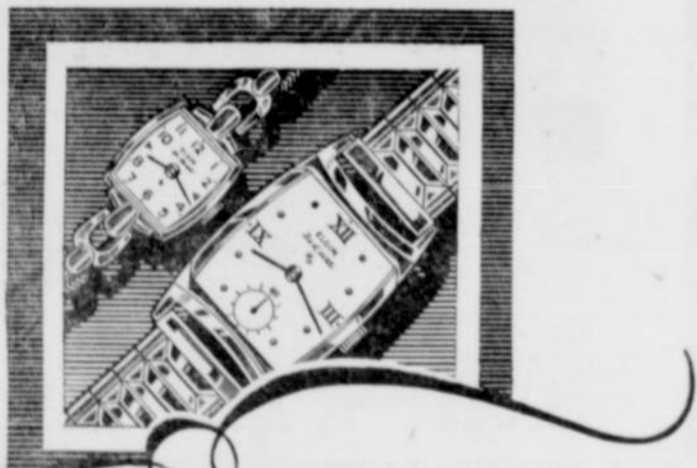

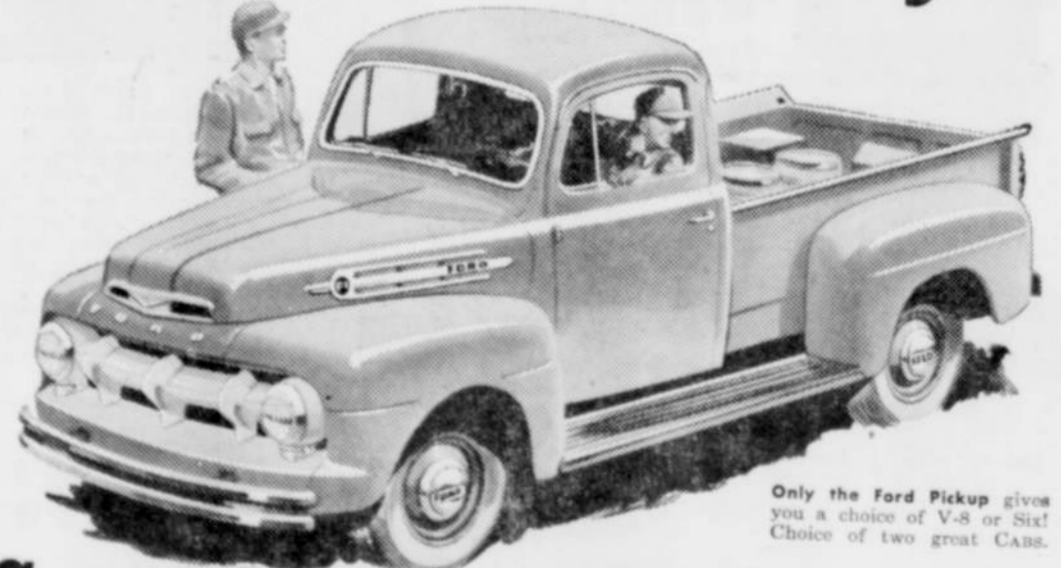

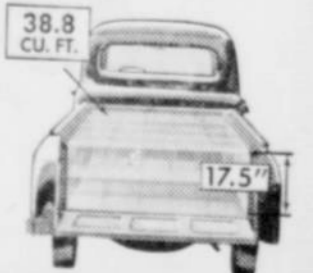
