**Democrats Numbered As Minority Party**

Tabulation of registered voters in Oregon's 36 counties indicate that registered Republicans outnumber Democrats by 7,642, Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry said this week. This is based on a statement of registered voters prepared by Dave O'Hara, elections manager, based upon close of registration April 15th for the May 16th primaries.

From a total of 2,273 precincts there are 387,717 Republicans registered; and 380,075 Democrats. Other registered voters listed include: Independents, 3,597; Progressives, 186; Prohibitionists, 233; Socialists, 156; and all others, 6,071.

In the 1950 primaries there were 346,038 Republicans registered, as against 354,575 Democrats, giving the Democrats a lead of 8,537 voters. These figures indicate a general increase in registration at this time, Newbry stated.

Total number of registered voters this year is 777,945; while in 1950 the total was 711,719, a gain of 66,226 voters.

**Wiring Modernizers Should Select Outlets for Needs**

ARE you planning to spruce up your home, by getting rid of tangled extension cords and messy "octopus" outlets? Then be sure to ask for devices that will serve your needs in each location.

Many different types are available to choose from. There's the familiar double receptacle for general use. Then, there are special switch and outlet plates in any combination desired. You can have several switches and a plug-in receptacle on one plate. Or, you can have a couple of switches, a receptacle and night light like the one shown. Generally, such combinations are used in halls where an outlet is needed for the vacuum, and switches are required for up and downstairs lighting and for a night light to avoid accidents.

In spots where many appliances are used, the new outlet strip will come in handy. It looks like wall molding and can be made to fit any wall area with outlets spaced at desired intervals.
