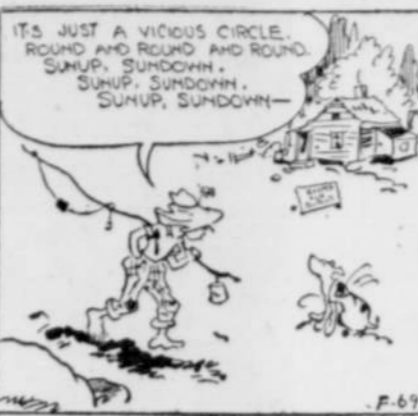

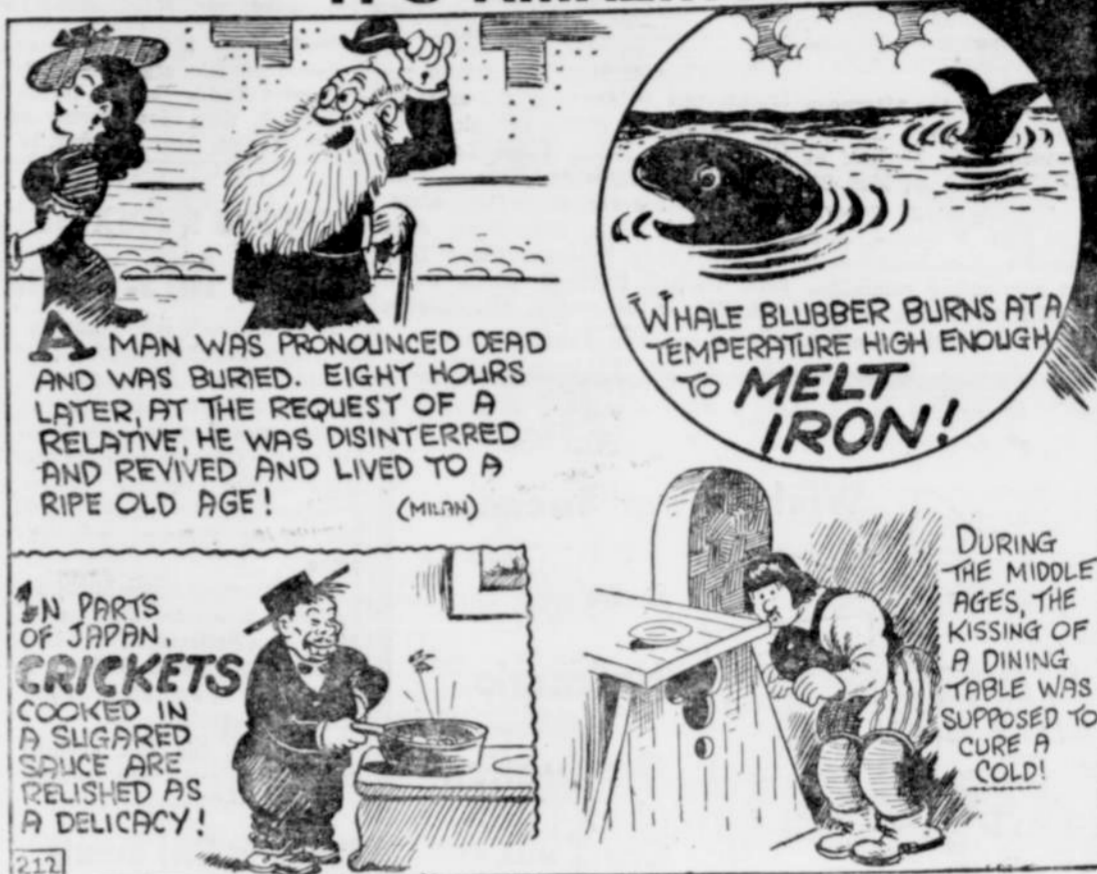

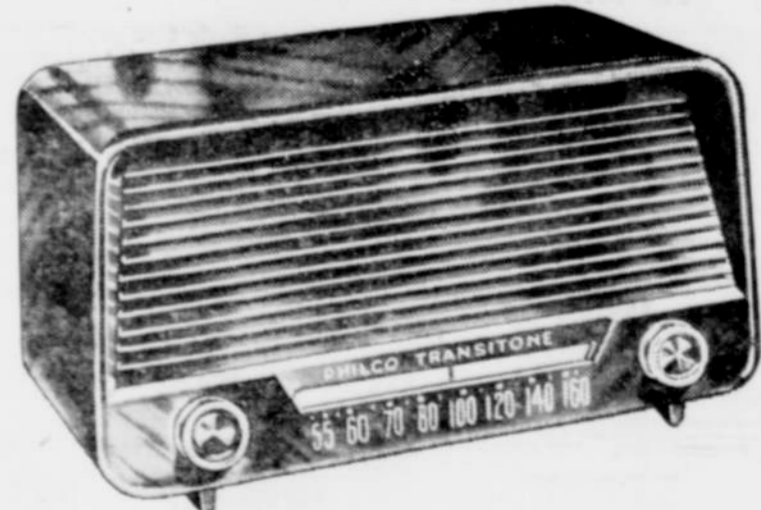
George Clise who has been employed in Alaska at Point Barrow, returned to Gates last week and will remain here for some time before returning to Alaska.
