Hermiston Planning July 4 Celebration

A merry-making, festive old-fashioned Fourth of July celebration will blossom forth again this year at Hermiston, according to Ken Hodge, secretary-manager of the Hermiston chamber of commerce. Hodge stated that much of the ground-work has been laid for the traditional tri-feature classic, and that this year's show will be "more spectacular than ever"; also, two-thirds of the events will be absolutely free of charge.

The Independence Day Jubilee will burst forth with a "bang" at 11 a.m. on Hermiston's Main street when the long-awaited starting gun launches the Firemen's championship water fight, a time-honored battle fought to the last breath to test the skill, courage and fortitude of the competing teams. The deep-rooted rivalry between this year's contestants will assure a hard-fought, hilarious battle before the championship is decided.

At 12 noon, Lloyd Knudsen and his dare-devil Motorcycle Ramblers will besiege the downtown area astride their thundering, high-powered cycles, after an exhibition of trick riding, they will retire to the county fair grounds in preparation for the time-trials.

From 12:30 to 1:30 p.m., the Hermiston park will be available for picnic lunches; a local service organization will probably be on hand to provide coffee and ice cream.

At 1 p.m., the gates at the Umatilla county fair grounds will swing open for the Hermiston annual northwest motorcycle classic; and the races will start promptly at 2 p.m.

Early that evening, a glittering spectacle of fireworks will rend the air and emblazon the countryside from "point zero" at the Umatilla county fair grounds. This magnificent display, including a masterful reproduction of Niagara Falls, is valued at well over \$500, and promises to be one of the most spectacular exhibitions ever viewed in this area. It is designed as a fitting climax to the 176th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence.
