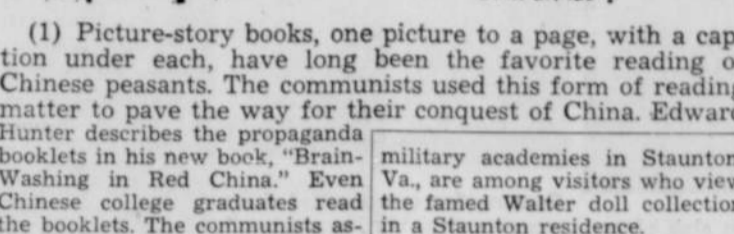
Christian Church Holds Election of Officers

Knowledge is Power



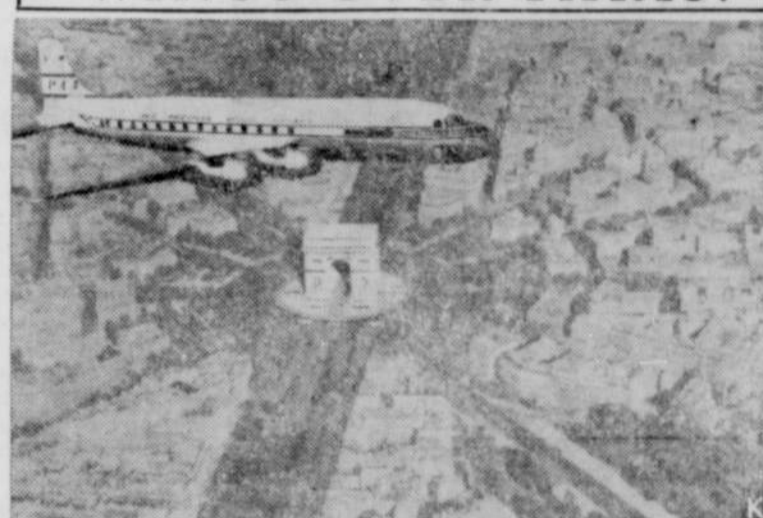

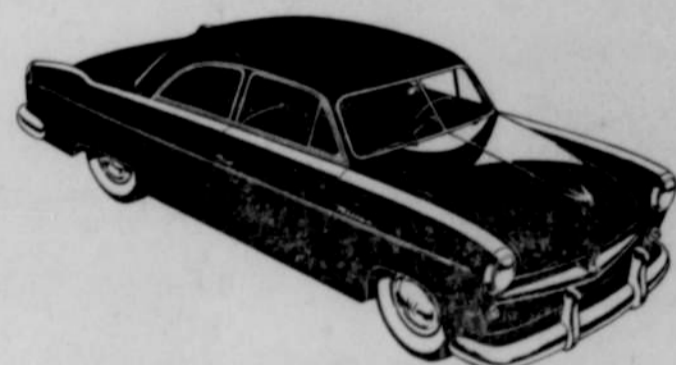
