## Memorial Hospital Auxiliary Reports

The Women's Auxiliary of the Santiam Memorial hospital has been an active organization during the past year.

Monthly meetings of the board of directors have been held to supervise activities. The organizing of chapters of the Auxiliary in all women's organizations of the area took up a good share of time during the months of December and January.

At a recent board of directors meeting Mrs. Earl Allen, chairman of the equipment and furnishings committee reported the sewing planned for the spring months was completed with the balance to be done in the fall. All cutting of garments was supervised by the past president's club of the American Legion Auxiliary and was done in the recreation hall of the Methodist church at Lyons.

To date a total of \$394 has been spent for materials and the value of garments made is approximately \$1,400. The materials were purchased from Don Roach, who furnished them to the auxiliary at actual cost.

Garments which have been completed include 36 needle wrappers, 36 syringe wrappers, 60 inside glove wrappers, 60 glove wrappers, 36 instrument wrappers, 24 large wrappers, 4 T binders, 24 abdominal binders, 6 scultetus binders, 24 breast binders, 6 pneumonia jackets, 24 hot water bottle covers, 12 dozen baby gowns, 12 dozen baby bands, 15 dozen large size patient's gowns, 4 dozen children's gowns in two sizes. Yet to be made are all articles which will be used in the surgery and delivery room.

Mrs. Allen reported members of the auxiliary chapters had continued to call for sewing after it was all distributed which shows a very find spirit and desire to work in this humanitarian enterprise. All areas were represented in doing the sewing.

During the year the resignations of Mrs. Mae Neitling, Mrs. Marion Miller and Mrs. Edna Ross have been accepted the regret. Mrs. A. I. Prugh has been elected to fill one of the vacancies on the board.

The operation of the Red Cross mobile blood bank has been discussed recently and the fact that our hospital will receive blood from it for transfusions as soon as the Santiam Memorial hospital is in operation has been noted. For this reason it was voted by the board to accept the responsibility of assisting with the Red Cross blood bank in the future. For this purpose a permanent committee headed by Mrs. A. I. Prugh will be set up as a part of the Santiam Memorial hospital auxiliary to completely organize blood donations in the area in order to have sufficient quantities of blood available at all times.

Because of lack of storage space and insufficient planning it has been decided that the canning committee will not function for this season. Plans will be completed early next year for the canning operation to use surplus foods and this committee will begin then to function.

Many of the committee will not be active until after the hospital is opened but all will be activated as they are needed. Also, some women who have joined the auxiliary have not been named to committees so a reserve may be kept for emergencies. Any woman in the area who would like to join is urged to sign a card at the Santiam Memorial hospital office. There are no dues and only one annual meeting is held.
