 PASTEURIZED MILK IS NEITHER COOKED NOR BOILED

Many people believe that the way to pasteurize milk is to boil it. But pasteurized milk is never boiled. It is heated only to a temperature of 140 degrees F., as this kills tuberculosis germs. One hundred and thirty-seven degrees kills typhoid and dysentery germs; 133 degrees kills septic sore throat germs; 135 degrees kills diphtheria, and 122 degrees kills infantile paralysis germs. So milk heated to 140 degrees kills all the germs. The milk is then cooled and bottled.
