Out of the Woods

Circle of Progress . . .
Olympia, Wash., is the center of a great circle filled with stories of Douglas fir forest triumphs on private and state lands. The Grays Harbor county and the Mason county examples have national fame. The Fort Lewis forest story is another star in the areas' green crown. There is the St. Martin's college forest at Lacey. Southward are Vail and McDonald Tree Farms, nationally publicized.
Folks do tell that in the outskirts of Olympia itself the residents are fighting back the young growth of the forest—it creeps up on them in the night and smothers the traffic lights!
At Nisqually is the thriving industrial forest nursery operated by the West Coast Lumbermen's association, and westward in the Black Hills the state's capitol forest nursery is surrounded by towering young growth.
Land Born Anew . . .
It is all historic country. The first sawmills north of the Columbia were in the area. The smokes of many fires clouded summer skies year after year from the 1840s into the 1920s. Now on clear summer days the skies keep blue and ever the land is bright and green. And land history is in the making again. Next fall the 55 millionth seedling from the Forest Industries Nursery will be planted on privately owned, taxpaying land, and in the same season the 35 millionth tree seedling from the state nursery will be planted on a state or school acre.
The Bordeaux family began logging in the Black Hills in 1899. Through the years strenuous tries were made to convert the stump-dotted hills and slashings into farms and pastures. On the site of the present nursery 40 Swiss families were settled at one time by the Mason County Logging company. They tried to drive the trees back with fire. The trees kept growing until the Swiss were crowded out. The story was repeated with others who tried to run livestock in the Black Hills.
In 1933 the state began purchases, paying as little as 50 cents per acre, of land within an area that totaled 110,000 acres. Soon the Capitol state forest was formed, with ownership of 85,000 acres and the state division of Forestry as administering agency.
Mike, Red and Bernie . . .
L. T. (Mike) Webster, present assistant state forester, has been in effect the field manager of the Capitol state forest and its nursery plant from the first. Homer (Red) Ward, the present nurseryman, also has a long record of service.

pany in its operations, the seed trees and the young growth that had survived the vain efforts to turn the land into farm uses began to cover the burns with seedling trees. Now Bernard (Bernie) Orell, state supervisor of forestry, has announced that the Capitol state forest of 85,000 acres will be classified as completely restocked in two more years, when the planting program will be completed. Nature, of course, has reforested 90 per cent of the land.
The one reservation pasted on the prediction is about fire. The young growth is also closing up over the black holes in the other ownerships of the total 110,000 acres within the boundaries of Capitol state forest. It is, as Stewart Holbrook has said, a sight to cheer the bleakest soul.
