Warning Issued For Care of "Dog Bite"

Recently several instances of dog bites have occurred in which the parties involved requested an examination of a dead dog for rabies. The dogs involved had been killed immediately after the biting. "It is impossible to examine a dog's brain for rabies after it has been shot through the head," explains Dr. J. W. Guepe, M.D., and Linn county health officer. A dog bite should be thoroughly washed and should receive prompt medical attention. The administration of rabies vaccine can usually be postponed until a laboratory examination is made.

The dog responsible should be securely restrained for 14 days. If the dog does not become ill or die during this period, it did not have rabies. If the dog becomes ill or dies, it should be taken to a veterinarian who should take the proper steps of the examination of the brain. The head must be removed intact, packed in ice in a metal container and sent to the State Hygienic laboratory.

Only two cases of rabies have been reported in Oregon since 1945. One occurred in Multnomah county in 1950 and one in Klamath county in 1946.

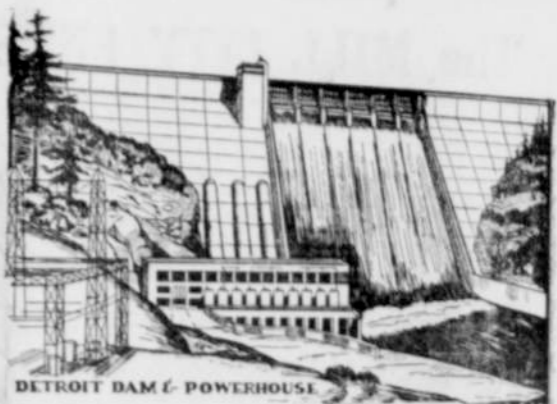

City Welcomes Softballers To '52 State Tournament

Newbry to Toss First Ball; Salem-Corvallis Opens Play at 4:30 p.m.; Mill City Meets Nyssa in Nightcap.

Eugene, Corvallis, Oswego, Salem, Tillamook, Central Point, Nyssa, and the Mill City host team open the 1952 Oregon Softball Tournament at Allen Field Saturday afternoon in what promises to be the strongest state tourney ever staged in the history of Oregon softball. As the result of the new 8-team double elimination playoff replacing the 16-team single elimination type, this year's tourney entries have gained a berth in the big show by winning a district championship and an inter-district playoff, leaving the top eight contenders to compete for the season's highest honor.

Newbry To Throw First Ball

Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry, will officially open the '52 State Tournament by tossing in the first ball for the Salem-Corvallis opener.

The field is sprinkled with perennial favorites such as Rubenstein's of Eugene and the Corvallis Elks, as well as two surprise entries from Nyssa and Central Point.

The Nyssa club gained a tourney berth disposing of last year's finalist from Hermiston by copping two straight games 5-4 and 1-0, which substantiates their role as the tourney dark horse.

Nyssa with a 32-3 win and loss record will oppose the strong Mill City host team that boasts a 43-5 season record against the state's finest competition.

Central Point, another new name in tournament play, earned their right to vie for championship honors by eliminating all competition in the highly regarded Klamath Falls and Grants Pass districts.

Six Repeaters From 1951

There will be six repeaters from last year's tournament held in Eugene, the championship Eugene club; third place winner, Corvallis; fourth place finisher, Mill City; along with Oswego, Tillamook, and Salem.

Prominent in this year's show is the pitching talent amassed by the eight squads. Most teams advancing with at least two outstanding twirlers holding enviable season records.

The defending champion Eugene nine, pre-tourney favorites, return with the unbeatable Bo Willis and stylist Ron Willoughby.

Oswego, opponents of the Rube's in the opening round, boast the slants of no hit-no run Don Pearson. Keith Marshall and Don Nelson lead the hard-hitting Tillamook club, and both Ron Davidson and Don Carey of the host team have hurled several no-no games.

Vern Collins of Central Point is top-notch tourney veteran, and Tommy Holman, who hurled for Corvallis last season, tops the Nyssa staff with no losses for the '52 season.

State Softball director, Ken Kerr of Oregon City, will arrive in Mill City Friday afternoon to establish headquarters and to approve the fine condition of the Allen Field with its many new facilities. All team managers are directed to report to Kerr at the Mill City Stadium or his living quarters in Mill City for final instructions, player passes, and to turn in official players' roster.

Included in the party were Wright and his son John, Stan Fresse of Salem, Larry Jack of Idanha, Howard Dean and S. T. Moore of the Detroit Ranger Station.

Moore and Dean entered the Jefferson Park area by way of the Breitenbush trail from the hot springs, making the 12 mile horse back trip to inspect trail maintenance and trail crews. Others of the party took a shorter route by Breitenbush Lake.

The return trip will be routed by Pamela Lake Saturday.

Transmission Line Contract Let

Clearing operations for Bonneville Power Administration's three-mile, 13,800-volt Big Cliff-Detroit transmission line are expected to get underway during the week of August 18, announces W. E. Trommershausen, area manager, Eugene. Contract for the clearing was awarded August 13 to B. P. Gerard, general contractor, Seattle, on his low bid of \$24,700.

Clearing of a 60-foot right-of-way, with adjacent danger trees, is expected to start near Big Cliff with an initial crew of about 15 men on the job. Trommershausen was advised by the contractor. Local power saw operators and general labor will be employed, if available, and contractors headquarters will be maintained at Mill City with Leonard Scott in charge.

"Bonneville's Big Cliff-Detroit line, scheduled for energization in November 1953, will initially supply construction power for the Big Cliff project," Trommershausen said. "After generation is installed at Big Cliff, the line will be used to link the power from Big Cliff with that from Detroit Dam for distribution at 230,000 volts to southwest Oregon centers."

Albert M. Woodside, Camp Mongold, Ore., will be Bonneville's project engineer. Right-of-way clearing is expected to be completed in 150 calendar days.

'Queen of the Kitchen' Contest at State Fair

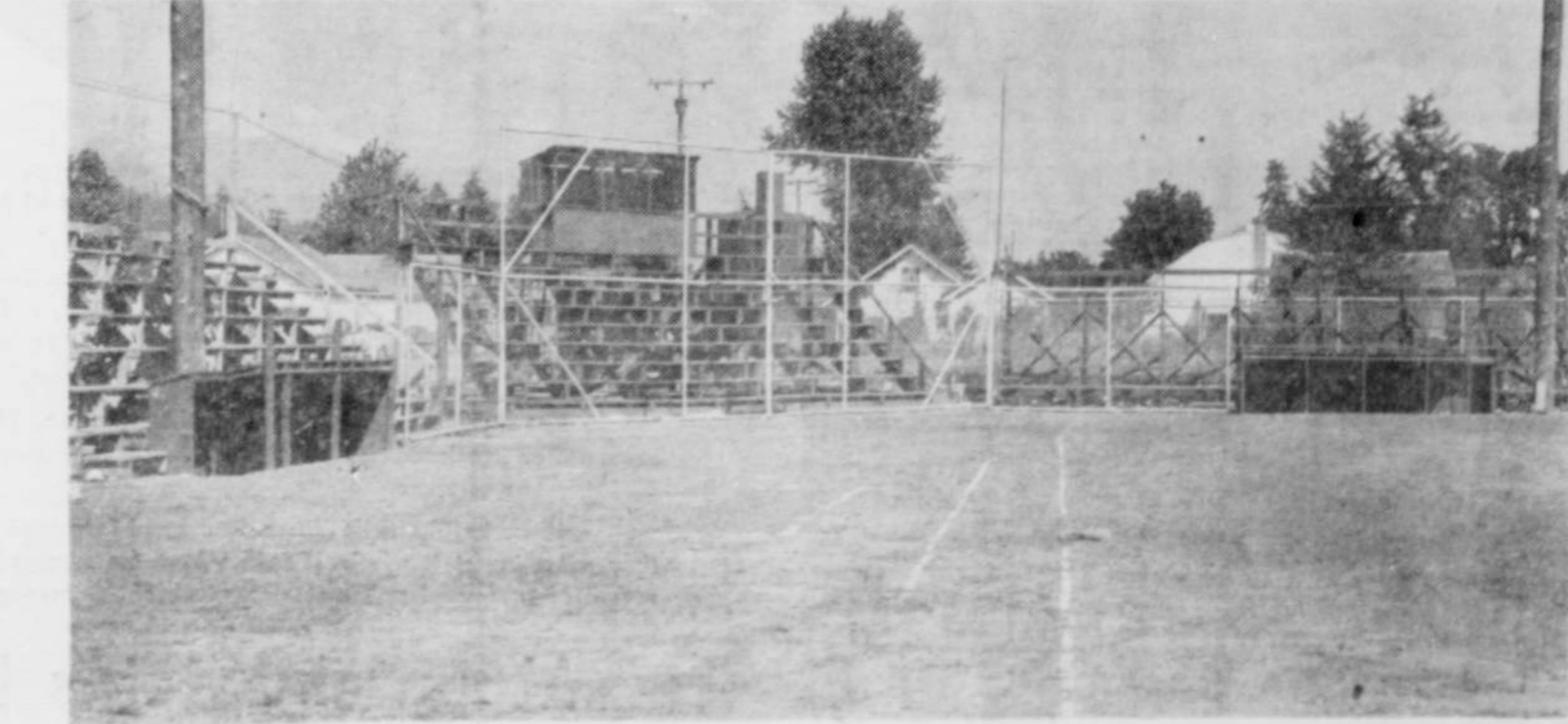
