Veterans Have Three Months to Apply

Only three months remain for an estimated 27,000 Oregon veterans to apply for their World War II bonus, the state department of Veterans' Affairs warned today.

Carl Cover, claims chief for the department's bonus division, reminded late filing veterans that December 1 is the deadline for making application. This date can only be extended by constitutional amendment, approved by vote of the people.

On the last day of August approximately 108,000 veterans or families of deceased veterans had applied for the bonus. The department expects to receive in the neighborhood of 135,000 applications, so this means about 27,000 have yet to apply.

Slightly more than 90,000 bonus checks have been mailed, as of the close of August, for payments totaling over \$37,000,000.

Cover said payments would be made faster if veterans would be patient and not inquire about the status of their claims.

The department has had to answer an average of 175-letters and 150 phone calls a day in response to these inquiries, Cover said, which takes the full time of three persons plus portions of the time of several others on the bonus staff.
