The cost of living in the U.S. has risen again to the highest point in our national history. Indications are that the worst is yet to come, for on Sept. 30 rent controls will end in most of the nation and millions of tenants will find rent increases awaiting them. In addition, the coming months will see a price hike of all steel products, thanks to the recent government price increase of \$5.20 per ton given the steel companies. It adds up to hardship and heartache as the greedy plunder the needy once more.
