### School Registration in Detroit Drops Sharply

Detroit—Enrollment in the Detroit schools this fall shows a marked drop over that of last year, according to O. J. White, superintendent.

The figure of 119 grade school students shows a decrease of 60 when compared with last year's register, while the present high school registration of 32 pupils is 20 beneath the

number enrolled last fall.

Principal cause of the large decrease in enrollment is the completion of the Detroit dam which has caused many workers' families to leave the canyon.

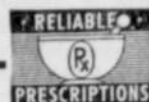

### SALEM MAN JOINS TAXPAYERS' GROUP URGING "NO" VOTE ON RACING BILL

SAYS:

"Vote No on the Racing Bill"

"Here's why we can't afford to lose pari-mutuel revenues:

(1) Taxes would go up. Next year the State Treasury would lose roughly \$1,000,000 in pari-mutuel revenue. We taxpayers would have to make up the loss.

(2) The fairs will suffer and may die. Our 36 county fairs depend to a large extent on pari-mutuel funds for existence. They'll each lose an estimated \$12,500 annually if racing is abolished.

(3) Oregon and its 36 counties receive more than eight (8) times as much as the track stockholders are paid in dividends. That's not unreasonable. In addition, official records and audits show that over 98% of every wagered dollar that produces this revenue, remains here in Oregon.

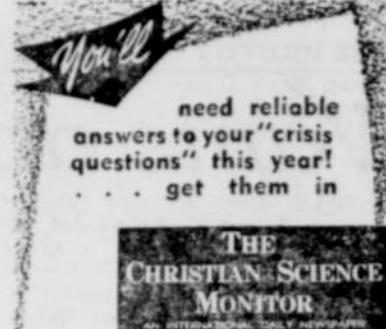
Miss Edith Veness has been visiting at the home of her brother and his family during the past week. Miss Veness expects to make her home in Mill City.
