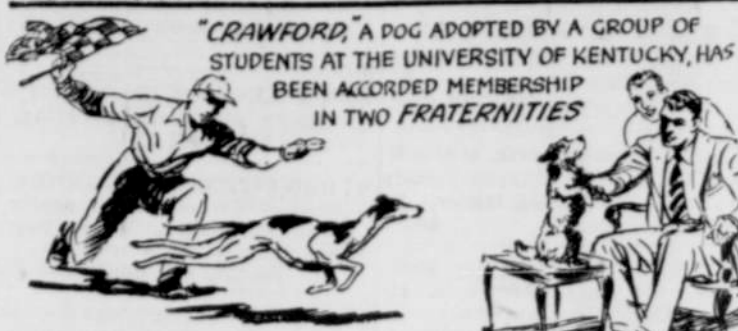
Fred Lucht of Mt. Angel, district commander installed the new Legion members in their various posts.

Monday, September 29, 1952—Ellery Silts, President of the Oregon Highway Council, the organization which placed the ballot tax initiative measure on the ballot that is under fire in a suit in the circuit court of Marion county, brought by Ben Chandler, chairman of the Oregon Highway Commission and others, today expressed the hope that the court would decide in favor of the plaintiffs.

"This suit," he stated, "asks that a price be placed on this law—that is, that under the provisions of a 1951 act, there be a statement printed on the ballot giving the amount of revenue that will be affected by its passage. This figure is arrived at by a committee composed of the Secretary of State, the State Treasurer and the Executive Secretary to the Governor.

"Attorney Gen. George Neuner has ruled that the provisions of the act do not apply to this particular measure, and we have been willing to abide by his decision.

"However, we see in this suit a means for getting a fair and impartial estimate of the public and the presented to the public and the clearing up of fantastic and irrational claims that are now being made. We hope the suit is successful, and offer any assistance in our power.

"We want only a fair and impartial presentation of this problem, and will do everything possible to bring it about."
