## Timberwolves Smash Saints

The Mill City Timberwolves exploded in the first two minutes of play in their last league game, last Friday night, with the St. Boniface Saints from Sublimity. Following the spectacular 85-yard touchdown run by Lyle Fleetwood of the Timberwolves on the first play of the game returning the opening kick-off Bol Stetner recovered the ball after a low kick rebounded from the leg of a St. Boniface player. Then the Timberwolves again raised the score in their favor after Fleetwood placed them in scoring position by a 45-yard run. Dick Kanoff made the touchdown and LeRoy Podrabsky plunged through the line for the extra point. The extra point for the first TD was not made.

Then the Saints took to the air and their passes netted them two first downs before they went over for a touchdown. The conversion attempt failed.

In the second quarter Podrabsky smashed through the line for another Mill City touchdown and a pass from Bill Hoffman to Evert Brewer got them the extra point. Then the Saints could not make first down so after the Timberwolves took over Podrabsky ran 40 yards to put the ball on the 14 yard line. After a 7-yard run by Kanoff, Fleetwood went the rest of the way to make the score 26 to 6 at the end of the first half.

In the second half the Timberwolves had three touchdowns called back because of off-side penalties. There was no scoring the third quarter but in the fourth Kanoff and Podrabsky both crossed the goal line and one conversion was made. The Saints broke loose in the fourth quarter to an 85-yard touchdown play for which the conversion failed. The outstanding defensive players were Evert Brewer on the line and LeRoy Podrabsky in the backfield. The final score was 39-12.
