

act to amend the Charter of the City of Mill City, Oregon, by amending Chapter III, Sections 6 to 12 and adding a new section providing for and relating to the appointive and elective officials, providing for the election of a Mayor, Recorder-Treasurer and Municipal Judge and the qualification of voters.

It is the belief of the council that only the mayor should be elected, so that they can hold better control over the offices of recorder-treasurer and municipal judge, while the proponents of the referendum feel that these officials should all be elected. The later feel that their amendment is passed since there is no conflict with the other measure but merely goes farther and includes all city officers.

Many voters marked their ballots with a "Yes" on both amendments, while it may have simplified matters if the voter had voted "Yes" on one measure and "No" on the other. A sizeable number were so marked, and several were not marked at all.




## STOP FOR SCHOOL BUSES!



Still confused about Oregon's school bus stop law? This is the way it works. On a two-lane roadway, you must stop when meeting or overtaking a school bus which has halted to load or unload children. On roadways having three or more lanes, you must stop only if you're traveling in the same direction as the bus. After having stopped, you must not proceed as long as any children are leaving the bus or crossing the roadway. To assist in holding traffic while children are crossing the road, all buses are equipped with red stop signal arms. You must stop for the bus whether or not the stop arm is displayed. Use of this signal by the bus driver simply indicates the situation requires you to remain stopped. The law applies equally to city streets and rural roads and highways.
