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Bureau of Mines To Hold Open House

Albany (Special) — Stephen M. Shelton, regional director of the northwestern region of the Bureau of Mines, has announced that an open house will be held at the Northwest Electrodevelopment Laboratory, Albany, on the afternoon of Nov. 21.

Tours through the laboratories will be conducted under the guidance of professional and scientific personnel from noon to 7:30 p.m. and will include visits to the various parts of the plant with demonstrations of electric smelting, electrolytic tin refining, mineral dressing, melting fabricating, rolling of metals and other types of laboratory demonstrations.

The Northwest Electrodevelopment Laboratory was established by the United States Department of the Interior in 1942 for the purpose of studying the application of electrical energy to the processing of the minerals in the northwest.

Albany is the headquarters for Region II, consisting of the States of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana. Located at the southwest city limits on the old Albany college campus, it comprises approximately 40 acres of land and 13 administrative, laboratory, shop and warehouse buildings. Equipment is of the most modern design available anywhere in the world.

The laboratory is presently engaged in the production of zirconium, hafnium and other rare metals under defense contracts.

Mr. Shelton said that so many people have expressed a desire to observe the work being done at the Albany laboratory that it was decided to hold an open house and invite the general public.

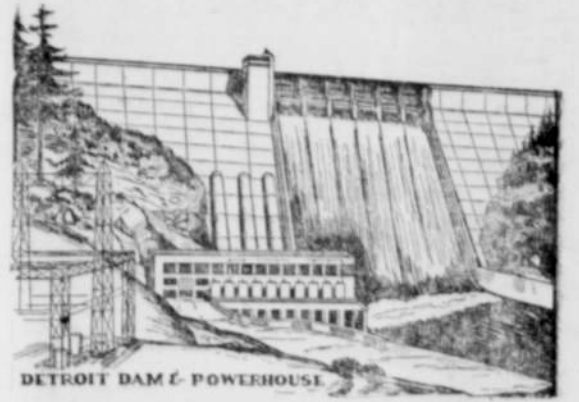

Linn county taxpayers have until Nov. 15 before they lose a healthy discount on their tax bills, according to Miss Anna Bender, tax deputy. Saturday, Nov. 15 is the deadline for Linn county taxpayers on the matter of a discount for speedy payment of their assessed taxes.

Linn county taxpayers mailing their tax dollars in on November 15 will be given the advantage of the discount provided by law. All such letters postmarked November 15 will be so honored, so says, Miss Bender.

The Linn county tax office in Albany will be open until 12 noon, Nov. 15. Prompt payment of taxes speeds up the administration of the business of the county, avoids needless expenditures of tax funds, and thereby makes possible the discount now effective, tax officials point out.

Willamette Univ. Presents Ballet Artists Nov. 17

Ana Maria and her Spanish Ballet will be presented at the Salem high school auditorium November 17, as the second in the 1952-53 Willamette distinguished artists series season.

Direct from a tour of her native Spain, Ana Maria, one of that country's foremost dancers, will make her appearance in Salem one of forty-five she is making on her third trans-continental tour under the direction of Impresario S. Hurok.

The company will present Manuel de Fallas' "The Three Cornered Hat" during the second half of the program, while the first half will be devoted to classical, folk and flamenco dances, chosen from the ensemble's extensive repertoire of more than 60 works.

The first Spanish ballet company to tour the U.S., the troupe made its debut in 1941 before the Pro-Arte Society of Havana after two years of organizational work by Ana Maria. Within six months, the Ana Maria Spanish Ballet had given more than 70 performances. Since then, the company has played at least three return engagements in each Latin American country.

Since the death of Argentinita, Spanish Ballet has been sadly lacking for want of an artist who could present it properly. Now that Ana Maria is again presenting this type of ballet, it should please our many balletomanes.

C. T. Haseman, 72, Idanha Mayor Dies

Services for Charles Theodore Haseman, mayor of Idanha, who died Wednesday at a Salem hospital, will be held Saturday at 2 p.m. in the Weddle Funeral Home at Stayton.

Ritualistic services will be by Mill City Lodge 180, AF and AM.

Haseman was born August 13, 1880, in New York City and came to Oregon in 1897, settling first in Yaquina and later in Detroit, Mill City and Idanha. He married Luella Sweeney at Albany in 1902. She died two years ago.

Haseman, in the logging industry at Idanha, was the first and most recent mayor of Idanha, having been elected to that office after the town's incorporation a few years ago. He was a charter member of Mill City Lodge 180, AF and AM; a member of Marilyn lodge 145, Eastern Star; Multnomah chapter 1, Masons; DeMolay Commandery, Masons, and the Al Kader Shrine.

Survivors include a daughter, Mrs. J. C. Raines, Bandon; two sons, R. C. Haseman and J. R. Haseman, both of Idanha; a sister, Mrs. Al Regner, Seaside; two half-brothers, Frank Walling, Portland and Harry Walling, Neskevin; four grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Washington Masonic History Observed

Portland—The magnitude of an approaching observation by Freemasons of the Portland area of the bicentennial of the Masonic membership of George Washington is indicated by the fact that between 250 and 300 persons will be participants. Some 50 of these will be members of Masonic lodges of the areas, while others will be members of the Order of Eastern Star; DeMolay; Job's Daughters and Rainbow Girls, all of which are in some way connected with Freemasonry. Also participating will be an all-city high school band and a cappella choruses from two Portland high schools.

This observance will be presented Wednesday, November 19, at 7:30 in the Civic auditorium, Portland. An organ prelude and a program by the all-city band and high school choruses will be followed by a four-act drama, "Salute to Freedom." This will show a street scene in Philadelphia the day before opening of the Constitutional convention, evening scene in a Philadelphia home and the final day of the constitutional convention. Lead parts are to be taken by members of some 50 sponsoring Masonic lodges.

The general public has been invited and there will be no admission charge. Nearly four million Freemasons of the United States are joining in observing this great date in Masonic history. George Washington received his Masonic degrees in Virginia and had his membership in two lodges of that state, being Master of one when inaugurated as first President, hence the grand lodge of Masons of Virginia has taken the lead in this observance.
