The December PTA meeting will be a covered-dish supper at the school cafeteria, Dec. 11.

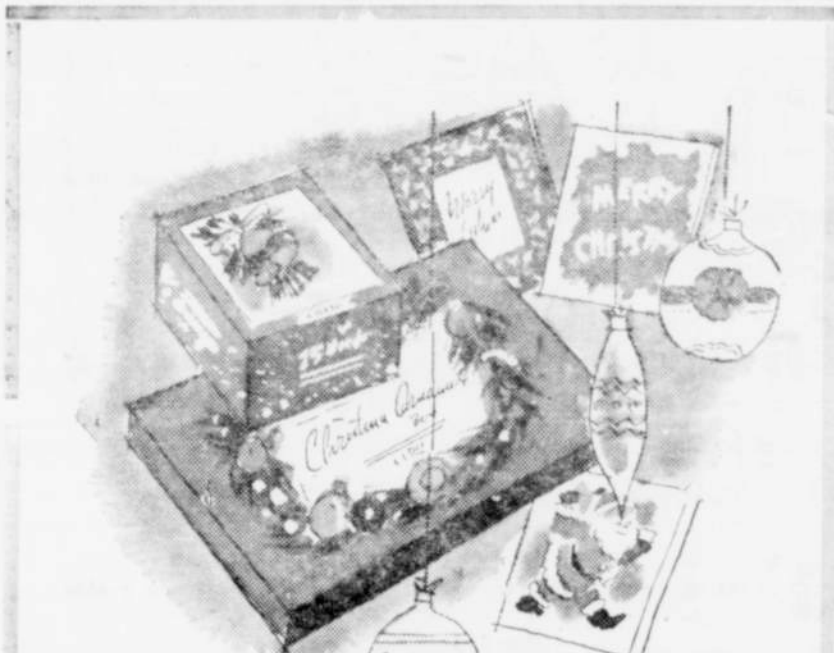
