and received \$3,850 from national. For 1949, we spent about \$16,000 which included the March of Dimes money, our savings, \$3,850 from national, and donations, and went into 1950 with our chapter badly in debt. On April 6, 1950, we had \$6,500.09 as our half of the March of Dimes and on May 4, 1950, we had \$626.37 to carry on the year's work.

Again organizations helped with money donations. Some of the families or recovered patients themselves sent us donations. The chapter sponsored the Horace Heidt show which

netted about \$1,300.

During 1950 there were 26 cases. We were not asked to help on all of them but we did carry 24 of this year's and other year's cases.

Once more there was no money to pay November and December bills and we went into 1951 with these bills waiting to be paid. Several organizations again came forward and paid part of the 1950 bills and in February 1951, the \$1,000 that had been advanced was repaid, so with this the most pressing bills were paid.

There were 23 cases in 1951. Ernest Kreft of Keiser was stricken on December 31, 1951 and was in an iron lung here for many days. As soon

as he was able, he was transferred to the Veterans' hospital in Portland. This chapter paid for his care \$3,881.30 before he went to the Veterans' hospital.

There were eleven cases of the 23 cases in Marion county in 1951 that were helped in 1951, and 19 cases treated that had polio before 1951.

On February 7, 1952, bills totaling \$2,117.40 were read and we had no money to pay them.

\$5,000 of the 1952 March of Dimes money was advanced at this time and in May, 1952, after all bills were paid, we had a balance of \$12,605.27 from the March of Dimes.

In October, thirteen cases had been reported in 1952 and our balance was \$8,818.23. Bills totaling \$1,812.00 were ordered paid.

At the November meeting, 14 new cases were reported, making a total of 27, four of which have been in iron lung cases. Four applications for help were accepted at this meeting. Bills of \$1,528.00 were ordered paid, which included the \$1,000 from the March of Dimes campaign.

At the December meeting, bills amounting to \$4,600 were presented.

About \$3,100 was for a young man of 22 from Donald who is in an iron lung in Portland. Bills for a like amount may be expected for him alone in January. Four more cases were reported, making 31 to date.

We are helping 18, 1952 cases and 22 cases that have had polio before 1952, and our balance is about \$500, so once more we will go into the new year badly in debt.

There isn't any place to stop paying when a patient's life depends on an iron lung, and there isn't any place to stop paying when the difference between continued treatment or not continued treatment means the difference of the use of arms or legs all the rest of a life time.
