It was decided to meet in the Mari-Linn gym on Tuesday and Thursday of each week, with Mrs. Alice Huber as instructor. Present for the meet-

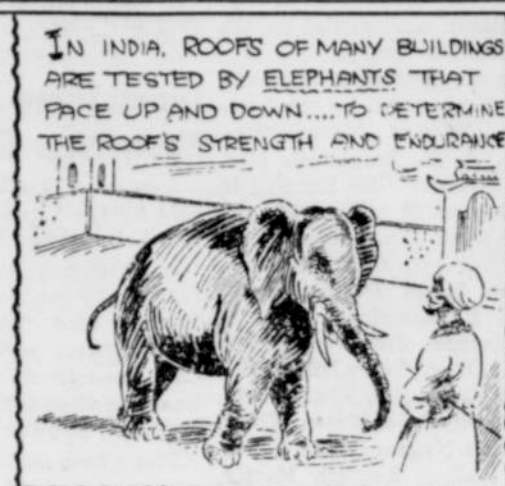
