To save time, get the rolls ready for the oven the evening before by spreading a loaf pan with a mixture of melted butter or margarine, brown sugar and chopped pecans. Place Brown 'n Serve rolls upside down in the butterscotch mixture and keep in a cool place over night. Butterscotch Pecan Rolls
 3 tablespoons melted butter or margarine
 1/2 cup brown sugar
 3 tablespoons chopped pecans
 8 Brown 'n Serve dinner rolls
 Combine butter, brown sugar and pecans. Spread over bottom of 1 quart loaf pan. Place rolls with tops down over sugar mixture. Bake in a moderate oven (400° F.) for fifteen minutes. Serve immediately. Yield: 8 Butterscotch Pecan Rolls.
